Hotelmen and Terrace split a Prince Rupert Senior baseball league double-header at the interior town yesterday, dropping the opener 4-1 and taking the second game 6-1.

## CANADIAN CHAMP SOUTHBOUND TO TACKLE RICH U.S. STAKES

TORONTO (CP) — Canadian Champ headed for the United States today and a shot at the rich stake races and the best American three-year-old thoroughbreds.

The big bay colt was on his way just 36 hours after winning the \$25,000-added Queen's Plate classic Saturday. His first stop was Cleveland where the \$40,000-added Ohio Derby will be run next Saturday.

The Champ's full U.S. itinerary hasn't been set but owner Bill Beasley of Toronto said after Saturday's runaway victory that his horse would take on the cream of American sires.

"We'll chase them from Maine to California, if necessary," Beasley said. "I'm going to give him every chance to prove he's the best Canadian-bred ever."

## Middlecoff Tops Field To Win Second U.S. Open

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (UPI) — Middlecoff has made Cary Middlecoff the world's greatest golfer.

When he won his second U.S. Open championship Saturday, posting a 281 total for 72 holes and then sweating it out in the locker room while Ben Hogan, Julius Boros, Ted Kroll and a few others chipped at him and dropped back, Middlecoff proved that he is the one golfer to beat in any tournament at this time.

The tall retired dentist from Memphis, Tenn., and Dallas, Tex. is 35 and has been rated among the leading golf professionals ever since he won his first Open as a sophomore pro in 1949.

Before the Open, when Hogan was saying the light rough at the Oak Hill course made it the easiest course on which he had ever played a championship,

Middlecoff said he would be happy to take a 281 score and stay in the locker room. He hit the winning figure right on the

tee with rounds of 71-70-70-70, Hogan, bidding for the fifth Open title — he lost last year in

a playoff with Jack Fleck — missed a 30-inch putt on the 17th green, and lost his chance for a tie. Boros, 1952 winner, three-putted the 12th green and then rimmed the cup on a final bold bid for a tie on the 18th. Those two tied for second, one stroke behind.

Kroll, with the best chance of all to win, fell apart on the closing holes and finished with a 285 total. Fleck failed to qualify for the final rounds.
