

## ad, Towing Service Urged Insurance Alternative

VANCOUVER (CP)—An emergency road and towing service as an additional feature to automobile insurance was proposed to the annual convention of the Insurance Agents of British Columbia. A resolution endorsing such a proposal was adopted by the delegates representing many sections of the province.

The resolution, which was adopted by the delegates, recommended the road-towing service could be established at an addition of \$2 a year to the premium.

One car owner in Victoria was reported to have installed a set in his car.

Nova Scotia has already banned the use of TV sets in cars, and other provinces have a ban under consideration.

The government will also be asked to call for standardized bumpers on all cars and trucks.

Minor collisions today bring heavy damage because on modern cars the grill does the work of the bumper, it was explained to the convention.

This is reflected in premium rates because of heavy claims.

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

Take the subject of pedestrian lanes.


### NOT SO SIMPLE

He was referring to the ace of spades and to prove his point he

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
