

SOCIOLOGIST TELLS ALL

Women Go To University For Men, Not Learning

MONTREAL (CP) — Brains may help build a feminine career, but men still prefer "less clever" women, a Canadian sociologist told the International Federation of Business and Professional Women Monday night.

Dr. Alleen Ross, a professor of sociology at McGill University, told a panel discussing "the woman executive" it was evident many women went to university "for men, rather than for learning."

And because men preferred less clever women, women in turn had to show they weren't too clever.

HIGHEST GOAL
With marriage held as a woman's highest goal and with a choice of marriage partners, women spent the years they should be preparing for careers at the "more arduous task of getting a man," Miss Ross said.

Dr. Ross was one of a four-panel speakers addressing the IFBPW's 17th triennial meeting which began here Saturday and ends Thursday.

More than 1,000 women, including some 950 congress delegates and observers, attended the panel discussion, with Senator Muriel McQueen Ferguson of Fredericton, N. B., as moderator.

Besides Dr. Ross, the panel included Elizabeth Feller of Zurich, Switzerland, president of the Swiss Federation, Lisa Sergio, of Woodstock, Vermont, editor of the IFBPW publication, and Brita Elmen of Goleborg, Sweden, president of the Swedish federation.

up the two-hour discussion concluded that the idea of women executives was not too popular but that reluctance to accept them was diminishing, and that personality was an important factor in getting and successfully keeping a top job.

Dr. Ross summed up her own remarks by emphasizing that the traditionally instilled behavior patterns for women, the preconceived ideas of what a woman should like and the lives with which women started thinking about public life were career obstacles.

The changing role of woman is a challenge to the adaptability of human nature, she said, and women must develop an "inner psychological security" and know what they want and should do.
