Miss Betty Prince, 24, formerly of Prince Rupert, graduated from Ontario, for two-month's of territorial work.

The graduation address was given by N. H. Knorr of Brooklyn, New York, president of the school and world organization of Jehovah's witnesses, who presented diplomas and announced service appointments. The graduation program was attended by all over the United States and Canada.

Miss Prince, who has now completed advanced training for special work as a missionary of Jehovah's witnesses was among 108 students from six countries including Belgium, British West Indies, Gold Coast, Lebanon, Canada and the United States.
