IT IS a surprising and pleasing fact that in the latest edition of an authoritative annual publication called Quick Canadian Facts, Prince Rupert is the only city in B.C. considered worthy of mention. Victoria is listed also, but only by reason of its being the provincial capital,

Prince Rupert is mentioned on the strength of its being the centre of an industry which is processing primary resources to create new consumer products. The publication remarks:

"Gross value of British Columbia's manufacturing output, estimated at \$1.5 billion in 1953, is six times as great as in 1939, and is only on the threshold of far greater expansion.

The operation of the Canadian Chemical and Cellusose Company's new wood pulp plant near Prince Rupert exemplifies how the province's primary resources are being processed by secondary producers to create employment and provide new consumer products on a national basis.

"White pulp made from B.C.'s hemlock, balsam and spruce at Prince Rupert feeds a great new petro-chemical plant at Edmonton where, formbined with chemicals secured from Alberta's natural gas, the wood pulp becomes a wide variety of materials to feed a host of factories across the country. Acetate yarn, for instance, goes from Edmonton to primary textile mills—scattered through the country but located mainly in Quebec and Ontario—and becomes fabrics that are, in turn, manufactured into clothing and many other textile goods in establishments from coast to coast.'

Such unanimity does not extend to some of the other costs of so-called modern, progressivist we education.


