## Churchill's Symbol

FT is not irreverent to say so, Sir Winston's place in Westminster Abbev-where one day in Dr. G. H. STEVENSON, the apparently still distant future he will almost certainly be laid to rest-should be mounted by two fingers raised in the form of a V.

By comparison, Hitler's raised palm and Stalin's elenched fist were chean theatrical gestures.

Even in defeat Sir Winston has courted victory. When he was voted out of office at the end of last war, he was unquestionably grieved but there was no sign of surrender or of a weakling's inclination to abuse those who had treated him so. Clearly he refused to accept the reverse as final.

Fortune probably has favored Sir Winston because he has dared to be different. When others sought to appease, he roured for aggression. More recently he changed his tactics and horrified his followers by proposing conciliatory talks with Soviet leaders on their own ground. This time he failed to gain his point but still remained the individualist, disdaining the orthodox approach.

Even in appearance he is different. In service uniform, with cap askew and his front rumpled, he which has been overlooked by looks more like a tugboat skipper than the giant of most people. his age. Julius Caesar, who was fearful of strong associates, asked to be surrounded by men "who are fat." It was an unkind and not particularly accurate slur on stoutness. But certainly in the case of a man like Sir Winston, Caesar's request would have been sadly misguided.

Churchill has been different, too, in his respect for the years. Eighty of them apparently hold no alarm. When a man can challenge age with a victory sign and come out the winner, he has surely established his right to immortality.
