

Manson's Go Down 62-50 Before Determined G & A

Gordon and Anderson handed Manson's its first defeat of the season last night in Senior B basketball action when they gained a 62-50 win over the jammers and posted a won-lost record of three and one to lead the loop.

Taking the initiative from the start, G & A snatched the lead in the first quarter and kept it by at least a dozen points throughout the rest of the game.

Manson's speed on the floor was more than offset by G & A's accuracy through the game as the winners made 74 per cent of their final tally with field goals as opposed to 68 percent for the losers. Both teams averaged 55 per cent on foul shots.

Manson's managed a 7-2 lead in the first quarter, but before the halfway mark, G & A took over on three field goals by Jim Flaten and singletons by Joe

Davis, Danny Bill, Harold Marshall and Rupe Holkestad.

G & A led 20-11 at the quarter, 31-19 at the half and 52-38 at the three-quarter mark.

Holkestad topped the scoring for the winners with 19 points, eight field goals and three points off foul shots out of four. Jim Flaten was runner-up for G & A with 14 points, six by field goals and a 50 per cent average on four foul shots.

More than half the points for the losers were garnered by the Scherk brothers. Don scoring 15 on seven field goals and one good free shot out of two, while Syd made 13 points on four field goals and five out of six foul shots.

Manson's made 34 of their 50 points on field goals, G & A 46 of their 62.

In preliminary action Wrenettes made their cage debut and went down to a 30-8 defeat at the hands of the Green squad of the senior girls' league.

In another senior girls' game, Dom's bested Gold by a 26-14 score, paced by J. Cloutier.

Manson's of the junior boys' loop proved too much for Ormes and racked up a 33-14 tally behind the accurate shooting of Don McIntosh.
