## No Major Changes Seen In Tax Rental Pacts

OTTAWA (CP)—Some question marks hang over next week's federal-provincial conference, but the central government's main approach appears definite.

It's fairly certain that the federal government will not propose basic changes in the set-up of tax rental agreements between itself and nine provinces. Statements by federal ministers in advance of Tuesday's meeting here indicate the government plans to stay, fundamentally, with the current arrangement.

Finance Minister Harris made this plain in his budget speech. It would be difficult, he said, to see any reallocation of taxing powers or sharper definition of revenue sources likely to meet all future contingencies.

### SEEK MAJOR CHANGES

But some provinces—and here is where the question marks come in—undoubtedly will seek major changes in the agreements which all provinces except Quebec have signed. They expire March 31, 1957.

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
