Eskimos won their third successive Grey Cup championship at Varsity Stadium Saturday afternoon by trouncing Alouettes 50-27 and the score was a close indication of the play as the Eskimos of Frank Ivy made this the most convincing all-around triumph of their three straight over Mon-

The Alouettes just couldn't stand up under the bonecrushing tackling of the Eskimos, who also gave their offensive ball carriers great running room with accurate and solid blocking. A record 448 yards rushing was run up by the Esks.

The game was not as exciting as the 1954 final won 26-25 by Eskimos or the 1955 game won 34-19 by Edmonton despite the record of quarterback Sam Etcheverry of Alouettes. But it produced several records and many outstanding perform-

It made Eskimos the fourth team in cup history to win the championship three timees in a row, equalling the feats of the University of Toronto in 1909-10-11, Queen's University, 1922-23-24 and Toronto Argonauts, 1945-46-47. The formula of coach Pop Ivy, whose outstanding football planning has won Eskimos the Grey Cup in each of the years he has been in Canadian football, took the championship West for the seventh time since 1909.

Important in that formula Saturday was Don Getty, 22year-old from London, Ont., who became the first Canadian to start at quarterback in a Grey Cup game since 1947 when Fred Doty handled Argos. With cool efficiency that instilled confidence in the rest of his teammates, Getty called a tremendous offensive game.

Jackie Parker, who moved to the halfback slot, scored three touchdowns and a single to break a one-game cup scoring record first set in 1913. He ran up a rushing total of 129 , yards and played great defensive football to become perhaps the most outstanding player in the game.

Johnny Bright, fullback who has beeen a major cog in all three Edmonton cup victories, ran up 166 yards rushing in 24 carries to lead the ground gainers. Rollie Miles, a brilliant defensive player, got 71 yards in 10 carries from offensive half, which he played for three quarters.

For Alouettes, Hal Patterson, chosen this year as the outstanding player in Canadian football, made spectacular catches of Etcheverry forwards, led the Montreal scoring and turned in a fine defensive game.

But Patterson's performance was not enough and only for the opening minutes did Alouettes hold an upper hand. The Montrealers led 7-6 after the first quarter, 14-12 midway in the second and 20-19 early in the third after trailing 19-14 at the halftime. In the third quarter, Eskimos ran up a 37-20

Shuffle-footed Parker scored three touchdowns and kicked for a single Saturday.

GETTY PLUNGES FOR TWO

Getty, understudy to Parker until the second game of the Western final this year, capped his winning performance with two plunges for touchdowns and a touchdown pass to Parker. Pright also got two touchdowns, as he did a year ago. End Joe Mobra kicked four converts in six attempts and booted a 25yard field goal. Mobra didn't get a chance at the convert try on the last-play touchdown by Parker because no football was available. The crowd had taken the one from the field and the man with the football supply disappeared.

The play caused some confusion in the final score. The scoreboard ran up 51 points for Eskimos, giving them credit for the convert before an attempt had been made to kick it.

Patterson scored two Alouette touchdowns, one on a forward pass from Etcheverry and the other on an end run. Etcheverry plunged for a touchdown as did fullback Pat Abbruzzi. Bill Bewley kicked three converts.
