

Musial Toast Of Milwaukee

Homer Gives Classic Story-Book Finish

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Stan (The Man) Musial, toast of the National League for the last 14 years, is the new darling of baseball-mad Milwaukee today even if he doesn't wear a Braves uniform.

Those who saw the great St. Louis Cardinal star smash a 12th-inning home run to give the National League an uphill 6-5 victory over the American in the 22nd annual all-star spectacle Tuesday, are convinced he's the greatest.

The story-book finish before a capacity crowd of 45,314, marked a fitting climax to a wonderful day for Milwaukeeans, who were treated to perfect weather for their first all-star home game in their third year in the National League. Not only did they see their heroes overcome what at one time seemed an insurmountable 5-0 deficit, but a trio of Braves had key roles in the thrilling comeback.

It was Johnny Logan, Milwaukee shortstop, who singled in the first National League run in the seventh. It was Henry Aaron, Milwaukee rightfielder, who singled in the run that made it 5-4 in the eighth and set the stage for Al Rosen's error that permitted the tying run to cross the plate. And it was Milwaukee pitcher Gene Conley's spectacular feat in striking out Al Kaline, Mickey Vernon and Al Rosen in the top of the 12th that preceded Musial's game-winning blow.

WILLIE TOO

There were other National League heroes, too. Willie Mays of New York Giants contributed greatly with two rally-igniting singles and a leaping back-to-the-fence catch of a towering drive by Ted Williams that had the home-run label torn off it at the last instant.

There was Ted Kluszewski, Cincinnati's slugging first baseman, who had a double and single and contributed a fielding gem on a sizzler by Yogi Berra that resulted in a rally-killing double play.

There were heroes on the losing side, too. Billy Pierce was brilliant in his opening three-inning stint. The little Chicago White Sox lefthander faced only nine as he struck out three, did not give up a run and allowed

only a leadoff single to Red Schoendienst. Mickey Mantle struck the game's longest blow, a tremendous 425-foot home run over the centerfield fence into the distant trees with two on in the first.

Frank Sullivan, the tall Boston righthander, also did well, hurling 3 1/2 scoreless relief innings until that fatal blow by Musial. But it was the 34-year-old Musial, the oldest National League player in the game, who received the biggest ovation and who was all but hugged to death by his joyous teammates when he smacked Sullivan's first pitch to break up the second extra-inning game in all-star history. The first occurred in 1950 when Schoendienst, another Cardinal star, homered in the 14th to give the Nationals a 4-3 win.

"I knew I'd get hold of one before the day was over," Musial said in the clubhouse. "Those pitchers were giving me a pretty bad time of it up to then."

Musial had struck out, bounced into a double play, tumbled over meekly and walked in four previous trips to the plate. The homer was his first in Milwaukee this year. Said Stan:

"The shadows were making it a bit difficult to see the pitcher and as I stepped into the batter's box I remarked to Yogi (Yankee catcher) Berra: 'It's been a long day, Yogi, and I'm getting tired.'"

Sacramento snapped Lou Kretlow's string of scoreless innings at 28 straight Tuesday night but his Seattle teammates staged a 4-3 come-from-behind victory to keep the fireballing righthander undefeated in the Pacific Coast League.

The Solon runner who crossed the plate in the fourth inning at Sacramento was the first to score on Kretlow since he joined the Roughies from the Baltimore Orioles last month. The win tightened Seattle's grip in second place.

First-place San Diego had a big inning, in whipping Portland 7-4. The Padres pushed across five quick runs in the first inning and coasted to victory.

At Los Angeles, Oakland split at doubleheader. Los Angeles won the seven-inning opener 4-1, with southpaw Joe Hatten scattering 8 hits. Oakland won the nightcap 3-1 behind Chris Van Cuyk's 5-hit pitching.

Except for one thing, the San Francisco Seals could be proud of their big second inning in their doubleheader with Hollywood. The Seals tallied 10 runs in the second frame of the nightcap, their biggest inning since World War II. But all were unearned.

Five Hollywood errors did the trick. San Francisco won 12-5. Errors also were a big factor in the seven-inning opener, which Hollywood won 3-1. Three Seal miscues let in two Star runs.



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
