Rockets will meet Prince Rupert Challengers in main cage events at 8:30 p.m. in the Civic Centre gymnasium, while La Gondola a.m. Booth Memorial High School Greens of the city's junior league meet in the preliminary at 7:15 p.m.

The seven-man squad brought here by Coach Peters are no newcomers to the Centre gym. Some missed the opening series last fall but were here with the Rockets contingent which played here in the 1954-55 season.




