## Fishermen Believed Killed By Fumes From Boat Engine

VICTORIA — A coroner believes that death may have crept up on three crew members of the fishboat Westerner as they rested during a lull in a savage Pacific storm.

The new theory was advanced as the shoreline of Saturna Island in the Georgia strait was searched for possible clues to the fate of a fourth man who was a member of the crew.

Coroner Dr. E. C. Hart decided after an examination Tuesday that carbon monoxide poisoning caused the death of the three men, whose bodies were found Monday in the ice-crusted wreckage of the 55-foot vessel.

They were identified as Marlan Govorchin, 55, owner of the Westerner; Bob Sulca, 60, and Joe Martinic, cook. Still missing and believed to have drowned is Ed Jones. All four were from Vancouver.

### FUMES FROM ENGINE

Dr. Hart said he surmised that the seiner had run into a calm spell and that the three men had gone below to get some sleep.

Storm damage to the engine might have brought on the poisonous fumes.

Dr. Hart said Jones must have been at the wheel during the storm and could either have been

## Ranger Players Best Shots Among Current NHL Marksmen

NEW YORK — New York Rangers; the early-season surprise of the National Hockey League currently rate as the league's offensive phenomenon.

The second-place Rangers do less shooting than practically any team in the league. Yet they're tied for the lead in goal-scoring with the league-leading Montreal Canadiens.

Statistics compiled by The Canadian Press show the Rangers have fired only 421 shots at their opponents' nets this season and have 45 goals to show for it.

The shootingest club in the league, Detroit Red Wings, have 34 goals from 575 shots.

### ONCE IN A WHILE

The figures show the opponent's Rangers score one in every 0.4 shots. The first-place Montreal Canadiens rank second in accuracy with an 11.4 average from 45 goals on 512 shots.

The fourth-place Chicago Black Hawks count once in every 13.4 tries and third-place Boston makes it once in 13.5.

Detroit has a 16.3 average and Toronto trails with 21.0.

### LEGAL NOTICE

FACILITIES FOR STORING FUEL-OIL AT MORSE CREEK, PRINCE RUPERT, B.C.

Sealed tenders will be received by the Department of National Defence for Canada if posted prior to 1 December, 1955, and marked for the attention of the Naval Secretary, Ottawa, Canada, for a license to use the facilities for storing fuel-oil at Morse Creek in Prince Rupert, B.C., more fully described hereunder:

(a) Three steel tanks for storing fuel-oil, each with a capacity of 4000 U.S. barrels, protected by bunding of earth, capable of being served by 12" and 8" pipe-lines through fuel pumps to outlets on a wharf.

(b) A building containing a steam boiler with a capacity of 6000 pounds of steam per hour at a working pressure of 125 pounds; and three fuel pumps, driven by a Diesel engine, with the necessary manifold and valves for the purpose of handling oil between the wharf and the tanks, and including an oil heater with a capacity of 1000 U.S. barrels per hour.

(c) The 12" and 8" oil lines extend from the fuel pumps to tanker and discharge outlets on the wharf, together with a 6" water-line for protection from fire.

The said facilities are available subject to the following conditions:

1. All the property subject to the license, including the wharf and a barge carrying the pipe-lines to the wharf, are to be made available to the licensee in their existing condition, and the licensee shall undertake no alterations without the written authority of the Department of National Defence. If alterations are required and authorized, the licensee shall make them good on the termination of the license and return the property in its former condition.

2. The licensee shall during the term of the license maintain, and at the end of the term shall return, all the property subject to the license, including the wharf and trestle, in as good a condition as when it was made available to him.

3. The licensee upon the termination of the license shall drain all the pipe-lines, empty the tanks, remove from them all sludge, etc., and leave the interiors of the tanks in a condition satisfactory to the Department.

4. In the event of an emergency, as defined in the National Defence Act, the licensee may, at the discretion of the Minister of National Defence, be terminated by him forthwith and without notice to the licensee.

5. Interested parties may examine the facilities on the site before tendering, and inspection shall be arranged by, and further information may be obtained from, the Civil Engineer in Chief, Naval Service, National Defence Headquarters, Ottawa.

6. The tenderer shall state in his tender the use to which the tanks will be put and the type and classification of fuel proposed to be stored therein.

7. The licensee shall indemnify and save harmless the Crown from all claims for damage or loss arising out of or in any way attributable to the granting of the license.

8. The licensee shall insure all property subject to the license against fire; he shall insure the installations and equipment also against theft, and the wharf and trestle also against collision. All policies of insurance shall be submitted to the Department for approval. The wharf shall be insured for \$50,000.00, and the rest of the property subject to the license shall be insured for \$200,000.00.

9. The licensee shall, for the purposes of the license, have use of the site containing about 44 acres.

10. The highest or any tender will not necessarily be accepted.

11. The tenderer should state in his offer for what period he desires to use the said facilities. They will be required by the Department except in the event of an emergency as stated above. (269)
