

SCHOOL BOARD BRIEFS

J. M. Evans Appointed Acting Vice-Principal

The appointment of Jack M. Evans as temporary acting vice-principal of Booth Memorial High school, was made Monday night by District 52 School Board.

Mr. Evans, will take on the duties of Frank N. Sutton who is presently on leave of absence in tranquille sanatorium.

The move, made on the recommendation of school inspector E. Ritchie, followed a letter from the Prince Rupert Teachers' Association, signed by R. Bennett, secretary, in which it was stated that the teachers' salary committee felt that a hardship was being worked on the teachers who were absorbing many of the vice-principal's duties.

The board was told that if the vice-principal was not going to be appointed some form of remuneration should be given to the teachers involved. The letter pointed out that this was a special mention of the matter by the teachers to the board and that they had received no reply.

Mr. Evans' appointment will be effective until school closes in June. A letter to the board from Mr. Sutton advised that he hoped to be back at his post in September or October. The board's decision was also prompted by the fact that Booth principal R. H. Davidson is ill at the moment and that trustees felt that "there should be someone in charge" at the school.

Chairman of the board Dr. R. Large welcomed new trustee Port Edward, John Davis, who was attending his first meeting.

Mrs. M. M. Roper, secretary of District 52 school board was instructed to write a letter to Allan G. Fellowes, honorary secretary-treasurer of the B.C. School Trustees' association expressing the board's appreciation for Mr. Fellowes' efforts on behalf of the Trustees' Elizabeth Madsen's room. Mrs. Madsen had contracted mumps.

Trustees were also asked by the trustees association to send a list of pertinent matters to be considered by the annual B.C. school Trustees' association conference at Cranbrook, September 7, 18 and 19. The problems and recommendations are to be discussed.

CARE OF SKIN  
A woman's skin is her greatest asset—and the some cosmetic houses which provide a variety of preparations to help solve any skin problem also give us the answers to the questions most often asked by women who seek advice.

What can you do for dry skin? Protection against over-exposure to wind, cold and sun, plus a balanced diet and daily lubrication are the ways to combat dry skin. Clean with a dry-skin cleansing cream, cold cream or facial cleansing lotion. Remove cleanser completely with a dry-skin freshener. Use a rich lubricating cream, oil or lotion at night and leave it on at least 30 minutes. Use a lubricant base under makeup. Masks, which encourage local circulation and help the skin retain moisture, are also useful. Take moderate exercise to aid circulation.

CLEANLINESS FIRST RULE  
What can you do for skin that has a persistent shine, a tendency toward large pores, blackheads and blemishes? These are characteristics of oily skin. Cleanliness is the first rule. Clean face thoroughly two or three times a day with soap and water or a non-greasy cream or lotion. Follow with an astringent lotion. When a complete cleaning is impossible, blot off excess oil with specially treated tissues or tissues soaked in freshener lotion. At night use a special oily-skin lubricant. Leave it on 10 minutes. Drink plenty of water and eat a balanced diet.

What can you do about skin that chaps, sunburns or becomes inflamed easily? You have a sensitive skin. Protect it in sun, wind, cold with a protective cream, lotion or make-up base. Try some of the bland creams and lotions created especially for sensitive skins until you find one that is right for you. If there is a possibility that your sensitivity is caused by an allergy, consult your doctor who may recommend hypoallergenic preparations.

CLOGGED PORES  
How can you get rid of blackheads? Since they are caused by clogged pores and usually occur in oily skin, scrupulous cleanliness is the first step. To loosen blackheads, hold face over a basin of steaming water, clean skin thoroughly with soap and water or with cream, liquid or lotion for oily skin. Use cleansing grains at least once a week. Medicated salves, masks and lotions also will help when used according to directions. Never squeeze or use a mechanical remover, as skin can be injured easily. If blackheads persist, see your doctor.

Can you shrink large pores? No, but skin fresheners or astringents which help stimulate the skin will make them less conspicuous. Masks also will help. EXERCISE HELPS  
If your skin is sallow and dull-looking, can you improve its color?


