Vancouver Mounties Gamble On Lifting of Sunday Ban

VANCOUVER Q.—The Mounties' entry in the Pacific Coast Baseball League, are scheduled to play 13 home Sunday doubleheaders this summer.

"Are you in favor of the city in a city where commercialized Sunday sport is against the law?" asked Ced Tallis, manager of the team known as the Acorns when it played in Oakland, Calif., last summer, explains it this way:

"We still think there is a good chance that legislation will be passed to allow Sunday ball. We had to plan one way or the other and decided to go along with Sunday sport."

If the legislation isn't passed, it will mean a juggling of the PCL schedule which will see Vancouver playing two doubleheaders each week on week nights.

"The matter is still under serious and careful consideration by the government," said Attorney-General Robert Bonner.

Under the federal Lord's Day Act of 1907, commercialized Sunday sport is unlawful but responsibility for enforcement of the act rests with provincial attorneys-general.

BEGAN IN 1950

In Quebec and some Ontario, Newfoundland and New Brunswick communities a set admission fee is permitted, following local option votes.

Growing pains were evident as far back as 1950 when Canada's third largest city, with a population of about 530,000, began a transition to big-time sports.

That year the vote was 35,000 to 25,000 against a "wide-open Sunday" for sports. In 1951 a vote on the desirability to have a "moderate Sunday" turned it down 31,091 to 24,813.

Vancouver moved up the ladder of big-time sport when British Columbia Lions were born two years ago, extending the Western Inter-provincial Football Union to the west coast and bringing renewed demands for Sunday sport.

Clarence Bric Lows, owner of the Oakland franchise, claimed a breach-of-faith; that the city council had promised to put the question to the people if he would bring the team here.
