

## CITY COUNCIL BRIEFS

# Tenders To Be Called For Equipment For Fluoridation Of City Water

Tenders will be called by C. J. Gustafson, city superintendent of works for suitable fluoridation equipment, it was decided at Monday night's city council meeting.

Mr. Gustafson was also instructed to go ahead with the construction of the building to house the fluoridation plant.

As a special project under the city's agreement with Associated Engineering Services, consultant engineers, the city intends to have all its plans organized into a ledger system. All important plans will be micro-filmed and stored on a cost plus 15 per cent basis. Alderman Norman Bellis, Board of Works chairman said,

Lagging for steam pipes at the city's Fire Hall will be bought at a cost of approximately \$291 and installed as soon as the material is delivered, council decided.

The council approved a wage committee recommendation for a proposed settlement of the city fire fighters' call-out pay dispute in regard to time off. The offer, already approved by the firemen members of the International Association of Fire Fighters, Local 559, calls for the men to be allowed accumulated time off at the rate of 2½ hours for day calls and 3½ hours for night calls. Time off is to be taken at one time during this year. For the period from July 1, 1955, until December 31, 1955, call outs are to be paid for on the basis of \$2.50 per call.

Fire Chief Earl Becker has been instructed to keep a record of the number of ambulance calls made on behalf of the Canadian Arthritis and Rheumatism Society, whose treatment centre opened February 4 at the Prince Rupert General Hospital. Firemen offered their services while not on duty as drivers for non-ambulatory patients referred to them.

Permission was granted by provincial government to install centre divider curbs for traffic control at the intersection of Second Avenue and McBride Street and a safety island at the intersection of third Avenue and McBride Street. Opposing the motion was Alderman T. Norton Youngs who proposed a se-

cond motion asking City Clerk R. W. Long to ascertain from the provincial government its authority to establish the traffic guides on arterial highways within the city. Motion passed with Ald. A. Don Ritchie dissenting.

The following parking sign changes were approved:

The parking sign on the north side of Second Avenue between McBride Street and First Avenue covering the sidewalk crossing at Rupert Motors used car lot is to be changed to read "No Parking from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m."

The "No Parking" sign in front of the Capitol Theatre is to be changed to read "No parking daily from 2 p.m. until 12 mid-night—11:30 p.m. until 8 a.m. Sundays."

Approval was given the purchase of 6,000 feet of telephone inside wire at an estimated cost of \$75.

Ex-Alderman George B. Casey wrote council on behalf of he and his wife thanking the council for the public reception accorded them in honor of Ald. Casey's retirement from public life.

Letters from Lino Colussi and John F. Denning bringing council's attention to the condition of Ninth Avenue East and its Conrad Street approach were referred to the Board of Works.

Also referred to the Board of Works was a letter from the Board of School Trustees for District 52 asking permission to narrow the entrance to Conrad Street school to 20 feet and also informing council that blacktopping of a section 16 feet by 179 feet was under consideration.

The School Board asked the city to undertake half the cost of the paving.

Mayor George E. Hills will appoint three delegates to the Prince Rupert Tourist Bureau. A request for parking space in front of the Museum of Northern British Columbia was referred to the licensing committee for study and report.

A request for financial assistance from the Salvation Army or the operation of the Lodge for Young Women was referred to the finance committee for consideration.

Protests from Shenton's Sheet Metal Works, Prince Rupert Amusements Ltd., the Capitol and Totem Theatre, and Ferguson Funeral Home regarding the recently revised trade license fee were referred to the license committee.

A request from Rev. T. W. Kennedy for exemption from taxation for a portion of their church building was tabled pending a report from the Court of Revision.

A request for special parking privileges on Third Avenue in front of his office by Dr. Donald Oakley was referred to the licensing committee.

Tenders from city representatives of national oil companies for the supply of the city's annual petroleum products were referred to the Board of Works for consideration.

Given final adoption was the Northern B.C. Power Co. Ltd. land purchase by law, No. 1284 covering the city's purchase of a Cow Bay lot for sewer installation.

The police and licensing committee will take under consideration a motion of Ald. A. Don Ritchie to bring in a "No Left Turn" regulation at the intersection of Third Avenue and McBride Street for traffic travelling on McBride in a northerly direction.

Ald. Peter J. Lester asked that the city advertise extensively that "there was an excellent opportunity for a dentist in Prince Rupert."

Chairman for the event is Charles Roberts.
