

Primers With Peronista Maxims Replaced In Argentine Schools

BUENOS AIRES Ⓛ — "I see she is pretty. She loves children. She gives them candy." That was what the first-grade girl memorized on page 39 of her reader.

The president of this great country is called "the Argentine worker." His name is Juan Domingo Peron. His motto: Happiness for the people.

The second-grader memorized that on page 11 of his textbook, "the third grade, the Argentine child was poring over more complex passages: "Peron raised our standard of living, wiping out hunger from all Argentine homes."

This was "education" under Juan Peron's dictatorship. Argentine education is being

de-Peronized. It is a task that anti-Peronista parents watch with special pleasure.


Busts of Eva and Juan Peron have come down from pedestals in hallways and classrooms. Pictures of the two have vanished from school walls. Books containing propaganda have been replaced by dusted-off volumes before Peron rose to power.

Peronista teachers are being seized control of his government.

The new caretaker regime of Maj.-Gen. Pedro Aramburu has proclaimed itself in favor of democracy and against extremists from either left or right. It indicates it prefers the moderate brand of catholicism.

Thus the new government repealed Peron's decree legalizing prostitution, but publicly denied rumors it plans to wipe out Peron's law legalizing divorce. It plans to study a concordat to govern relations between Argentina and the Vatican. It has said nothing about restoring religious education to schools.

Catholics were shocked into militant unity during Peron's anti-church campaign. Since then a subtle split has widened between those who think the church should reign supreme, and more moderate Catholics, Christian Democratic party, generally considered a liberal Catholic force, is stepping up its activity.

Miss Brash led the queen of spades and dummy's ace won, Mr. Champion dropping the nine spot. The jack of hearts was led and it held when Mr. Champion did not cover. Mr. Muzzy, then finessed the queen of hearts and picked up the king with a third lead of the suit.

"THINKING"

Here he put on his "thinking act" for the benefit of the kibitzers. This consists of keeping his mind perfectly blank, staring at the ceiling and pulling at his lower lip.

It accomplished nothing but looks good to inexperienced players who might be watching. Finally he came out of his trance and promptly led a club from the board.

KEY PLAY

I'd have to put dummy in with either a diamond or a spade and you could discard a loser on the queen of clubs. That way you'd make ten tricks."

Fire Prevention Code Published

MONTREAL Ⓛ — The Dominion Board of Insurance Underwriters has published a uniform fire prevention code. It is Canada's first.

Individual provincial government or municipal authorization is required to make it legal. But it contains a suggested ordinance for adopting the code and establishing a bureau of fire prevention.

The new code is based on the recommended fire prevention code published by the National Board of Fire Underwriters in the United States. It has been specially adapted to meet Canadian needs under normal conditions.

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Active TB Discovered Faster By New Method

MONTREAL (CP) — A new and faster method of detecting active tuberculosis in a suspected victim has been discovered at the Royal Edward Laurentian Hospital.

Dr. Edith Mankiewicz and her staff at the hospital have discovered a new method of detecting tubercle bacilli in two weeks. Formerly it took five weeks.

The improved method consists in "tracing" the early growth of tubercle bacilli with a yeast much research work at McGill University, became interested in tuberculosis during her student days at the University of Lyons, France.

Many years of research by Dr. Mankiewicz and her staff besides work of numerous other groups throughout the world, have been successful in hundreds of cases.

Before the development of Dr. Mankiewicz's method it took five to six weeks to confirm, by cultural methods, the presence or absence of tubercle bacilli in a patient.

ALLEVIATES ANXIETY

During this long period of waiting, adequate isolation of the patient could not convincingly be urged, a hospital announcement said.

With Dr. Mankiewicz's new method, much of the anxiety of the waiting patient is eliminated and spread of the disease is checked by early isolation of the victim.

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DR. HANS RUDOLPH FRISCH of Toronto, Austrian-born chemist, says he has discovered revolutionary new principles by which the winter can be predicted shortly after the rains begin. Dr. Frisch says the general principle of this, after the first 10 rains, which are called the "opening game" and which have been standardized for centuries, the winter can be predicted with 65-per-cent accuracy by adding up the possible moves.
