In this position, as in all others he had held, he performed conscientiously and well. But towards the end of the term it became apparent that his health would not allow him to do much more such

Nevertheless it was typical of Phil that even in these final months he was determined to give his utmost and his best. Obviously he had some unusual quality that made this output possible. One friend has described him as having attained perfect peace of mind. Certainly this much can be said—if he did have his troubles, he never unburdened them or others.

Prince Rupert has lost not only a valued frience but a remarkable man.




