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

## \$150 Fine or Two Months For "Unprovoked Attack"

Fred Faulkner Jr., of Prince Rupert, charged with assault occasioning actual bodily harm was fined \$150 and costs in police court this morning by Magistrate W. D. Vance or in default of payment to serve two months in jail for what the magistrate termed "an unprovoked attack" on Daily News editor Dick Ayres, October 17.

The charge arose from an incident during which Mr. Ayres was injured after being thrown over an embankment by the accused who objected to a news picture being taken of his car which had been involved in an accident.

The accused pleaded guilty to the charge.

Defence counsel Jerry Pettenuzzo told the magistrate that Faulkner had been at a wedding party and had loaned his car to a friend. The accused had been called from the party, Mr. Pettenuzzo said, to find a picture being taken of his car which had travelled off the road across the sidewalk on McBride Street between Sixth and Seventh Avenues.

### FELT PRIVACY INVADED

The defence counsel stated that the accused had believed at the time that the newspaper had no right to take a picture. Mr. Ayres added that Faulkner had thought a news picture would give his friends the impression that it was he who had been in the accident.

"There's no doubt that the accused overstepped the bounds of propriety, but he believed he was protecting his privacy," the defense counsel stated.

Magistrate Vance said that he could not understand such a belief, inasmuch as car accident pictures appeared in newspapers daily.

"These pictures bring the attention of younger people to what speed can do when driving," the magistrate stated.

In giving the circumstances of the incident, Mr. Ayres said that

"I suggest you cut down on your drinking. The attack was unprovoked and your own fault entirely," Magistrate Vance said.

## Bathtub Mariner Heads North

WHIDBEY ISLAND, Wash. (UPI) — Roy Bergo, who has reversed the usual situation by putting his bath tub in the water, was set to sail again today on a trip he says will take him to Alaska.

The odds, coast guard officials and the weather are against his ever getting near the northern territory in the pontoon-equipped baby bathtub in which he travelled 12 miles Tuesday.

He landed on this island in Puget Sound some five hours after he left Edmonds, just north of Seattle. The water was calm, the weather clear and the approving coast guard sent along an escort "just in case."

The accused had flung him down the sidewalk, onto the road and over a five-foot embankment on separate occasions, Mr. Ayres stated. He was off work a week, still hadn't full use of his left arm, and suffered bruises and abrasions, the news editor said.

In answer to questions by RCMP Corporal Adam Willigpope, Mr. Ayres stated that he had not provoked Faulkner in any way, but had merely insisted on his right to take a picture.

In summing up, Mr. Pettenuzzo stated that the fight had been a shoving affair and that Mr. Ayres had been injured as a result of the fall over the embankment. The defense said that accused felt that blows had been struck by both sides, adding that Faulkner was deeply sorry and wished to make restitution for doctor's bills and clothing torn in the action.

Before passing sentence, Magistrate Vance said that Faulkner's police record showed him to be of a turbulent nature, especially when drinking.

"I suggest you cut down on your drinking. The attack was unprovoked and your own fault entirely," Magistrate Vance said.
