

## Saturday Sermon

St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral

"THE ROCK WHENCE YE ARE HEWN" — Isaiah 51:1  
As we read our Bibles we are aware that a Nation seems to have some particular significance and destiny under God's leading. There were times when the spokesmen of old spoke not just to certain individuals but to a whole people in the Name of God.

Since it is true that God's presence is for all living and not just for certain people at certain times, we cannot get away from the truth that the solitary are set in families and the families are set in nations. In this sphere they all have to share a common burden of work and of guilt and a common inheritance of material resources and tradition of behaviour. They need all this to work out in actual experience the truth of God's salvation.

Canada is a nation despised and misunderstood by thousands who come to her shores and earn their bread and raise their families. But it is time that we started to emphasize the sacredness of Canadian Nationhood as equally scared and different from that of England, Norway, Italy, Holland or the United States.

Much of the controversy which went on in the columns of this newspaper concerning Long Hair and Short Hair and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation was inspired by un-Canadian thinking. I am convinced that many of the contributors to the dispute are looking at our culture from a foreign viewpoint.

Canada is a dull and earnest nation from the foreign viewpoint... not much humor, color or brightness about us. But we have a climate which is like that and a land which has taken many generations of desperate and heroic pioneering.

Let us be proud that we are as we are and let us know that under God's leading as a people have a destiny and purpose to fulfill which is not simply the aping of the British or the Europeans or the Americans, nor apologizing for being different. It is time Johnny Canuck said quite clearly both on his own soil and outside:

"By the Grace of God, I am what I am."
