Fishermen's Coverage "Unjust, Inadequate"

VANCOUVER (CP)—Bill Rigby, research director of British Columbia's 9,000-member fishermen's union, today branded a Social Credit plan for optional workmen's compensation coverage as "unjust and inadequate."

He was commenting on a plan by the provincial government to give 15,000 B.C. commercial fishermen compensation coverage if they pay for the benefits.

The scheme, not contained in the Workmen's Compensation Act amendments now before the legislature, offers coverage to fishermen on an optional basis if they want to pay about three per cent of their average earnings into the compensation fund.

"We are very disappointed the government has still not seen fit to include fishermen in the terms of the compensation act," Rigby said.

Because of varying legal interpretations some fishermen now are covered and some aren't depending on the operation in which they're engaged.

"There's nothing new in the plan announced by Labor Minister Wicks. It was tried last year with only a small minority of fishermen taking advantage of it," Rigby claimed.

"Fishermen are being discriminated against because compensation benefits are furnished from assessments on every other major industry."

"We'd even be willing to pay for benefits ourselves if all fishermen could be brought under the compensation act," Rigby said.

Speed Limit Upped

Certain Roads To Be Designated

VICTORIA (CP)—The speed limit on certain parts of new British Columbia highways will be increased to 60 miles an hour under a bill given third and final reading in the legislature yesterday.

At the same time, Attorney-General Robert Bonner said: "No one need fear that speed limits are going to be raised throughout the province. The speed limit higher than the present 50 miles an hour is going to be permitted only on certain highways which the minister of highways is

authorized to designate."

Mr. Bonner said the increased speed would not necessarily increase the rate of accidents. He explained, however, that higher speed did increase the severity of damage resulting from accidents.

Leo Nimsick (CCF-Cranbrook) criticized the government's action, contending 35 miles an hour was sufficient on many B.C. roads. He added that many motorists believed they have to go 50 miles an hour when they see a sign limiting speed to 50.

As a result, he said, drivers usually exceed the limit by about five miles an hour.

Vincent Segur (CCF-Revelstoke) recommended that automobiles be tested at the time they are licensed to ensure the maximum safety of the public.

The proposal was supported by Bert Price (SC-Vancouver Burnside).
