

Veal at Its Flavorful Best



Entertaining is always fun; and, if you've shied away from having friends in for dinner because of rising food costs, try this simple solution: Veal creole with savoury topping — high in food flavor, low in cost.

VEAL CREOLE WITH SAVORY TOPPING
2½ cups vitamin enriched all-purpose flour ¾ cup shortening
1½ lbs. veal shoulder 1/3 cup concentrated consomme (approx.)
1 teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon garlic salt

Sift together flour, salt and garlic salt. Cut in shortening with a pastry blender or two knives. Add enough consomme to hold ingredients together, sprinkling evenly until a ball is formed. Roll dough in rectangle a little larger than your 10" x 12" baking dish.

VEAL CREOLE

4 slices bacon ¼ teaspoon pepper
1 medium onion 1 8-oz. can tomato sauce
1½ lbs. veal shoulder 1 6-oz. can tomato paste
1 garlic clove, minced 1/3 cup water
1 tablespoon all-purpose flour ½ cup white raisins
flour 2 teaspoons parsley, fresh
1 teaspoon salt or flakes

Cut the bacon into small pieces and chop the onion. Place in heavy skillet. Add veal, cut into 2" cubes, and garlic; cook until brown, stirring occasionally. Blend in flour and seasoning, then tomato sauce, tomato paste and water. Add raisins and parsley flakes and cook covered over very low heat for about ½ hour. Turn into baking dish, top with pastry and bake for another 1½ hour in a 400° F. oven.


