THE ANSWER TO OUR PROBLEMS

Judge Philip B. Gilliam, of Denver's Juvenile Court, was a delegate of the U.S. Information Service, in India, at the same time Dr. Billy Graham was holding services there. The Judge sat in on a press conference conducted by the Evangelist, and also heard him preach.

Concerning the service, Judge Gilliam said:

"Dr. Graham didn't appeal to the emotions; but my wife and I sat there with tears in our eyes. We have been church members for years but I believe we will be better members after hearing him. I believe I will be a better judge when I return to Denver. As I sat there I couldn't help wishing that every juvenile delinquent who appeared before me in the last twenty years could have heard him. He has the answer to their problems."

The Christian Business Men's committee of Sacramento, Calif., invited General William K. Harrison, the U.S. Army's Caribbean area commander to address them at a rally in the Governor's hall on the State fair grounds. He told the audience of more than 1,000 persons that mankind is in a state of futility and frustration because much of the world is trying to live independently of God.

The General asked what makes the difference between people who practice deceit and the five missionaries who were killed by primitive Ecuadorian Indians while trying to teach Christians.

He answered his own question by saying:

"Jesus Christ, that's all that makes the difference." He pointed out that men are not without hope. "The debt of sin was paid once for all by the Saviour on the cross. He paid with his life the wages of sin which is death," the General said. "But God raised His Son from the dead through Him. But the gift is offered salvation full and free of no value unless we accept it."

Dr. Graham and General Harrison are in perfect agreement in saying that the answer to the problems of juveniles, as well as adults is found in the glorious person of the Lord Jesus Christ.

The reason for the agreement is that both men got the answer from the Word of God. This has been the answer to the world's problems down through the centuries. When Philip met the Ethiopian on his way back from Jerusalem and heard him reading from Isaiah 53, he began at that same Scripture and preached unto him, JESUS.

When the Lord Jesus was on earth, no one coming to Him with problems was ever turned away without a solution to those problems. He still invites all to come to Him by faith. All who come are forgiven and are made new creatures in Him.

This is the testimony not only of Scripture but of experience.

Popular Pastor, Family Leave For Mission City

Lawrence G. Sieber, pastor of First United Church of the past seven years, left Prince Rupert today with his family to take up new duties as minister of the Andrew's United church in Mission City.

Born in Parks Falls, Ontario in 1905, Sieber attended public school in North Bay, Ontario and Elkhorn, Ontario, where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Sieber, during the First World War.

In 1924, Sieber moved to Edmonton, Alberta, received his high school education at Strathcona High School, then graduated from the University of Alberta in 1930 with a Bachelor of Arts degree. At St. Stephen's College in Edmonton, Sieber received a Bachelor of Divinity degree and was ordained in Knox United Church in Calgary on May 26, 1933.

Mr. Sieber's ministerial career began in Lethbridge, Alberta, from there he went to Stony Plain, then in 1937 to Revelstoke, B.C. in 1943. It was from Revelstoke he received his call to Prince Rupert in August, 1949.

While in Revelstoke, Mr. Sieber headed the citizenship rehabilitation committee, was a member of the board of trade and worked on housing, electrical and power committees, was a member of the hospital management board and an active member of the Rotary club as well as supporting the Air Cadets and the sponsoring committee.

While in Revelstoke, Mr. Sieber also was the chairman of the Kamloops-Okanagan Presbyterian.

Besides becoming a highly repected friend to hundreds of Prince Rupert people in his church as well as outside, Mr. Sieber found time to take an active part in the community life of Prince Rupert.

Mr. Sieber has been a member of the National Hospital commission, member of the Prince Rupert Rotary club, chairman of the Prince Rupert Citizenship council, as well as an officer of the Borden Street school Parent-Teacher association, one of the directors of the Cancer society, a member of the local Air Cadet Squadron and an active member of the Prince Rupert Curling club.

During his tenure here, Mr. Sieber has served as secretary and then president in the Prince Rupert Ministerial association, as well as chairman of the church board.
