

## Police Find Boy Reared Like Fowl

BELFAST (UPI)—Police today discovered a boy, apparently about seven years old, who has never bathed, cannot eat human food, grunts like an animal and roasts like a chicken.

Sgt. Hugh Ross said the "pitiful little boy" was found in a henhouse at Down Patrick, in County Down 15 miles from Belfast. He was taken to a home in Belfast and turned over to physicians for examination.

Ross said a group of children playing "hide and seek" ran into the henhouse adjoining a cottage occupied by a widow and her two grown daughters. The children found the boy perched on a roost with the hens and roosters.

"He cannot talk, he cannot walk and he cannot eat human food," the sergeant said. "He has been reared like a chicken."

HOPS LIKE APE

The mat of hair on his head did not appear ever to have been cut or washed. He had claw-like fingernails which probably never had been trimmed.

Sgt. William Hamilton, official of the national society for the prevention of cruelty to children:

"He gets about by hopping like an ape and he replies to voices with grunts in a half-human fashion."

Police would not give the name of the widow, who is being questioned.

## Mayor-Minister Leading Drive Against Negroes

CLAY, Ky. (UPI)—Mayor Herman Clark, outspoken foe of non-segregated education of Negroes and whites, says he personally will lead this small Kentucky community's campaign to rid the clay school of its only two Negro students.

"I'll not rest until James and Teressa Gordon return to a school where they belong," Clark said in an interview.

"We will follow a policy of passive resistance by keeping our children out of school until the Gordons leave."

The movement started Wednesday when all white children in the 600-pupil school walked out after the Gordon children entered classes under protection of 500 national guardsmen and 10 state troopers.

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## Well-Known City Pioneer Mrs. M. Lockwood Dies

Well-known Prince Rupert resident, who came to this city in 1908, Mrs. Margaret Lockwood, died yesterday at the home of her son-in-law, C. J. Gustafson, 363 Ninth Avenue West. She was 70 years old.

The wife of fisherman Frank Lockwood, she was born in South Wigston in the Midlands of England and came to this country with her parents in 1885 settling in Holland, Manitoba.

At the turn of the century, she moved to Minotons, Manitoba. In 1887 she married Alexander Walker and came to Prince Rupert a year later.

Unmarried, he is survived only by two cousins, Vill Grimson of Sidney, B.C., and Mrs. Kristjan Edmon of Prince Rupert.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at Ferguson Funeral Home at 2:30 with Canon Basil S. Prockler officiating.

Mr. Walker, a member of

the city's early police force as a sergeant, enlisted in the army in 1908. Mrs. Margaret Lockwood died shortly after hostilities ceased from war disabilities.

In 1935 Mrs. Walker married Frank Lockwood.

For the past several years she has been an invalid.

She is survived by her husband; four sons, Charles Walker, in Stewart, Archie of Terrace, Robert of Vancouver and John of Edmonton; a daughter, Anne, in Prince Rupert and a sister, Mrs. Elma Madigan of Winnipeg.

Funeral services have been set for 2:30 p.m. Monday at Ferguson Funeral Home with Rev. V. E. McEachern of the First United Church officiating.

## Burns Urges End to Strife On Border Jordan Claims Post Attacked

JERUSALEM (AP)—Maj.-Gen. E. L. M. Burns has called on both Jordan and Israel to put an end to the series of border incidents which have exploded in the middle of the worsening Suez crisis.

Jordan military sources charged Wednesday that 1,000 Israelis in a fleet of trucks and armored cars blew up a fortified police post and killed 20 Jordanians during a two-hour battle.

This attack, one of the most serious along the Jordan-Israel border in months, was only three miles from where the Israelis claimed six of their soldiers were killed by a Jordan patrol Monday.

TWO ISRAELIS KILLED

The raid was followed by an Israeli report that two Israeli guardsmen were killed by infiltrators from Jordan on the road between the Dead Sea and Red Sea. Another guardsman was missing.

The Canadian general who heads the United Nations truce team appealed to both sides to end the "tragic series of events."

In a communiqué, he declared that the raid appeared to be "an act of retaliation such as has been repeatedly condemned by the Security Council."

The Israeli newspaper Maariv says the raid "should teach the Arabs that Israel's security forces are on guard and will severely punish every murder and act of sabotage."

There have been five clashes on Israel's borders this week.

## New Trial Ordered; Juror Rapped

KAMLOOPS, B.C. (UPI)—A murder trial jury was discharged and a new trial ordered at the Kamloops fall assize Wednesday because of what Mr. Justice J. O. Wilson of the British Columbia Supreme Court termed the "idle" actions of a juror.

Trial of Gordon Cleo, 17, and Halld William Eustis, 20, charged with murder in the death of Johnny Sampson, 49, was to have entered its third day.

When the hearing opened Wednesday evidence was given that Don Slater, a Kamloops Elks hockey player serving on the jury, left his hotel room via a window Tuesday night and was in a position to communicate with other persons.

An RCMP officer on jury guard said he warned Slater that he could not leave the room. He said he was informed a few minutes later by another juror that Slater had gone, and that he left to bring him back, returning the missing juror through the window with the assistance of the other man, Roy Cummings.

The trial judge said the only safe thing he could do was to order a new trial. He said a specific date will be set later if the new trial is to take place at the present assize.

Mr. Justice Wilson said Slater will be brought before him later "so I can determine what action can be taken."

ACTOR INJURED

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (UPI)—Actor Brad Crawford lost his balance and fell face down from the rear of a truck on a movie location Wednesday. He is under treatment in hospital for painful but not serious injuries.

Both were members of a work crew of Campbell Construction of Victoria, engaged in enlarging the Malahat highway to Trans-Canada specifications.

The youth is a son of the resident engineer on the project and Whyte, a member of the Auto Workers Union now on strike here, only began work on the road Wednesday.

Both were crushed under hundreds of tons of rock when a 10-foot rock cliff, on which they were "mucking" rocks, crumbled.

## Egypt Threatens War If West Tries To Control Suez Traffic

## Soviet Asks France, U.K. To Keep Calm

LONDON (AP)—Egypt told the western powers tonight their plans to control the Suez canal traffic—if carried through—will flash off a new war.

And Russia, which has backed up Egypt's seizure of the vital waterway, moved back into the storm with urgent appeals to Britain and France to keep their guns in their holsters.

Egypt's "this means war" warning was delivered to the United States, which with Britain and France sponsored the idea to pilot their own ships through the Suez collect dues and share the income with Egypt.

LONDON (Reuters)—Prime Minister Eden this morning staked the life of his government on the new plan for the Suez Canal. He called for a vote of confidence in the House of Commons tonight, that Britain, the United States and France have proposed establishment of a canal users association to use ships through the vital Middle East waterway.

## Wife Back To Battle For Pension

VICTORIA (UPI)—The silicosis stricken Mrs. See Zucco vowed Wednesday from her cold seat on the legislative building steps: "I'll stay here until election day, September 19."

She started her second day on the stone steps at 3:30 a.m. in protest against British Columbia's Social Credit government for not granting her husband a silicosis pension.

Mrs. Zucco, from Vancouver, claims her husband is eligible for a workmen's compensation board pension on grounds he contracted silicosis as a minor, but she says he has been refused a pension because he later got tuberculosis, and the scar tissue hides x-ray evidence of silicosis.

Nobody from the government has approached her, Mrs. Zucco said.

Tuesday night she slept in her car in front of the buildings.

"I've got cold feet," said the 34-year-old mother of four, "but only literally."

She spends her time reading newspapers, writing letters and knitting.

## Defence Minister Refutes Reports About Retirement

VANCOUVER (UPI)—Defence Minister Ralph Campion says he is not considering retirement.

"I might say that the rumors in some newspapers about my retirement are like the news of Mark Twain's death, somewhat exaggerated," Mr. Campion said Tuesday.

"I expect to be running again in Vancouver Centre with your support and to be elected again with your support."

The minister, on a flying visit to Vancouver, was speaking at a meeting of the riding's Liberal association.

## Gaglardi Denies Threatening To Fire Civil Servant Who Queried Him at Rally

VANCOUVER (UPI)—The Vancouver Sun quotes a civil servant in Nakusp, 50 miles northwest of Nelson, B.C., as saying that Highway Minister P. A. Gaglardi was heard to threaten his dismissal for asking questions at a Social Credit election meeting.

Mr. Gaglardi denied making the threat. At the same time he attached what he called the "insidious, diabolical method" of the opposition parties in this campaign.

He said he asked Mr. Gaglardi about Premier Bennett's proposal to return \$20 of property taxes to homeowners. Mr. Wood says he rents his home and doesn't qualify for the rebate.

"I said I understood the money was to come from our natural resources, which all the people own, and wanted to know why I didn't come in for a share."

"Gaglardi suggested I go out and buy a house, I told him I couldn't afford to because I was working for the government."
