## As To Aid TLC Funds, Aims Fail Motion To Boost Dues Defeated

Thursday night inception of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council (TLC) 43 years ago, would have increased the labor group's revenue in Prince Rupert a meagre \$940 a year to \$960. The vote was taken on a motion to increase the per capita dues from 10 cents per quarter to 15 cents per quarter, after a notice of motion was lifted from the table after two months. The same motion was defeated earlier in the year at one of the biggest meetings in the history of the Trades and Labor Council.

## ATTENDANCE FIGURES SHOW SCHOOL POPULATION RISE

Attendance in School District 52 has risen by 130 since June this year, a list of attendance figures from eight schools in the district shows. The number of children attending school during the summer vacation was 1,925 in the schools just before the vacation. There are 47 more at Booth and 11 more at School and 92 more scattered throughout the district. The attendance in the schools is as follows: Booth School, 273; Conrad Street and Seal Cove 400; 2nd and 3rd Port Edward 18; Digby 22; Port Essling 35.

## Power Company Official Criticized by Report on Dam

Referring to the October 12 issue of The Daily News, Mr. Black said a front-page story had stated that "a cursory examination of the Northern B.C. Power Company's intake dam at Woodworth Lake and the 45-inch penstock was made by engineers from Associated Engineering Services." The story also stated, Mr. Black said, that "the highly deteriorated condition" of the dam was noted by the engineers and a report made of these observations to the council. Mr. Black asked the engineering consultants, that if the news page story was correct, that in future they refrain from making further examinations or issuing similar "erroneous" statements. Mr. Black's letter continued: "Enquiries at the Company's office in Prince Rupert by your representatives would have been welcomed and they would have been informed of the very large amount of work already performed by the Company in pressure grouting the core of the dam and of the work in progress on the penstock and on the rear face and apron at the base of the dam."

## Queen Phones Margaret At Royal Meeting Place

BINFIELD, Eng. (CP)—Queen Elizabeth talked to her younger sister today in a lengthy priority telephone call to the country mansion where Princess Margaret and Group Capt. Townsend are guests for the weekend. Reliable sources said the Queen had telephoned from Balmoral, her Scottish summer residence, and that telephone lines from nearby Reading were cleared for the call. In another development today, the Queen Mother left Clarence House, the London residence where she and the princess live, for the first time since the meeting there Thursday night between the princess and Townsend after his arrival from Brussels on home leave. She drove to the royal lodge at Windsor, about 10 miles from where the princess and Townsend are staying, to spend the weekend.

## Labor Urged To Register For Voting

Members of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council were urged at their regular meeting Thursday night to make sure they register for the forthcoming civic elections, now that city council had waived the \$2 registration fee for householders. Peter Lester, Local 708, Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers delegate said that the TLC, having worked long and hard for the abolishment of the \$2 fee, should make sure that all members went up to the city hall and registered before October 31. He urged each delegate to go back to his local and impress upon the membership the necessity of registering and taking advantage of the franchise. "If this is not done," Mr. Lester said, "the work of the TLC will have been wasted."

## Manitoba Premier Urges Second Trucking Parley

MANITOBA — Premier Douglas Campbell of Manitoba said Friday that trucking regulations should be made uniform across the country to keep pace with Canada's vast industrial expansion. In a speech to the Vancouver board of trade transportation bureau and the Automotive Transport Association of B.C., the premier said he was in favor of inter-provincial motor vehicle transport conferences, such as was held in Winnipeg in 1954. "We can't remake transportation rules across Canada in the wink of an eye," he said, "but we can make progress at a second conference." He hoped a second conference would be held this spring in either Ontario or Quebec. Mr. Campbell said the issue was becoming important because Canada stands on the threshold of great industrial expansion, and transportation is the main artery "carrying the industrial life-blood of the nation."

## West "Vulnerable" Claims Alexander

EDMONTON (CP)—Earl Alexander, Britain's former defence minister, says "there is no cause for easy optimism" in the world today. The British field marshal told the English-Speaking Union Friday night that "We are still highly vulnerable in Europe; and Russia, as far as I know, has not ceased building up her strength in the air or at sea."

## Bus Crash Kills Six, Injures 20

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind. (AP)—Six passengers in a two-decker Greyhound bus were killed and 20 others were injured early today when the bus crashed into a parked semi-trailer truck. Capt. Ogden Jarvis of the Michigan city police said at least six of the 20 injured were in critical condition in hospitals. A police list of the injured included the name of Hans Henkel, 26, of Winnipeg. Police had no street address for him and the extent of his injuries was not immediately known. The big, new bus crashed into the semi-trailer on U.S. 20, a four-lane highway, about six miles east of Michigan City. Killed were four women and two men, all identified as either from Chicago or California. Jarvis said 26 persons were on the bus, bound from Chicago to New York. One of those critically injured was the bus driver, Thomas Locke, 39, of Chicago. Police said the bus rammed the rear of the truck, and the impact pushed the front part some 10 feet back to the start of the second deck. "There appeared to have been no panic," Jarvis said. "Everybody on the bus was hurt, some fatally. The bus seats were twisted and mangled and the bus was a total loss." The truck overturned on its side after the collision. Harry Williams, 43, the truck driver, told police he had stopped his truck, loaded with 1,000 pounds of freight, to repair a broken air line. He set out four flares.
