UN Membership 76 As Deadlock Broken

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP)—Ten years of deadlock and frustration came to an end Wednesday night as the United Nations welcomed 16 new members into its ranks.

A new move by Russia, only 24 hours after 15 Soviet vetoes had buried a Canadian-sponsored proposal to admit 16 applicants, made the 16-member deal possible, increasing the UN's membership to 76.

Omitted from the original list of 18 were Japan, vetoed twice in as many days by Russia, and Outer Mongolia, vetoed by Nationalist China Tuesday in the move which touched off the flood of Soviet vetoes.

After the Tuesday session of the Security Council in which the 18-member proposal was killed there was sharp criticism of Russia and Nationalist China.

EMERGENCY SESSION

Then, at 4 p.m. Wednesday the council met in emergency session at Russia's request.

Soviet delegate Arkady A. Solov'ev quickly got to the point.

After blasting Nationalist China's veto of Outer Mongolia and the cause for the package plan's failure, he made this announcement:

"Wishing to co-operate, the Soviet Union withdraws its negative vote to the admission of countries, either for two years of university or for senior matriculation and second year university."

Two Persons Still Lost As Storm Havoc Assessed

Snowdrifts still obscured the picture today as the Prairie provinces counted dead, searched for missing and restored transportation and communications in the wake of one of their worst blizzards.

After howling for two days, the storm eliminated Wednesday night and sub-zero temperatures and light winds prevailed, allowing the plows to open up road and rail lines. The further the plow progressed, the clearer the picture became of the havoc created by the three.

Of the three provinces affected, Saskatchewan was by far the worst off. The bodies of two men were found and two men were missing. In Alberta and Manitoba, no fatalities were reported and persons earlier reported missing were found safe.

The bodies found were those of George Shepherd, about 30, of Regina, and RCMP Inspector D. J. McCombie.

Shepherd, an auditor for British American Oil Co. Ltd., was travelling from North Battleford to Kerrobert, Sask. He left the car, apparently after it ran out of gasoline, and his body was found Wednesday at the doorway of an abandoned farm building. It was believed he died from exhaustion.

The car was found about 10 miles west of Kindersley in western Saskatchewan. The car had been driven into a ditch and the driver had been thrown out.

Nothing has been heard for three days from Lawrence Hanson, a farmer, who left Kindersley in western Saskatchewan Monday to load grain 30 miles away.
