Hartwig Defeats U. S. Star To Enter Aussie Net Semi

MELBOURNE (AP)—Rex Hartwig, a country boy from nearby Culcairn, and Philadelphia plumber heir Vic Selgas emerged as the strong men of the respective Australian and United States Davis Cup teams today as American hopes sagged with the defeat of Tony Trabert.

Trabert, Uncle Sam's broad-shouldered blockbuster who carried most of the weight of the U.S. team a year ago, fell in straight sets before the slashing Hartwig in the quarter-finals of the Victorian tennis championships, 6-3, 6-3, 8-6.

Selgas, the disappointment of America's 1953 cup bid, meanwhile, continued to show sparkling form as he cut down Mervyn Rose, Australia's national champion, 6-3, 6-4, 3-6, 4-6, 6-4.

In the first two sets the Philadelphia, who holds the U.S. championship, looked unbeatable, but he suffered an unconscious relaxation and almost let Rose slip away.

Not so Hartwig, who kept the pressure on Trabert with a slashing game and probably earned himself a singles spot on the Australian team over Ken Rosewall.

Rosewall also reached the semi-finals, but he had to play one extra set and go overtime in another set before subduing Ham Richardson of Baton Rouge, La., 6-1, 3-6, 7-5, 6-4.

Hartwig, who has been the consistently best amateur in the world the last six months.

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Boomer Geoffrion Apparently Headed For New National Loop Goal Record

MONTREAL (AP)—If hard-shooting Bernie (Boom-Boom) Geoffrion of Montreal Canadiens keeps up his early-season scoring pace he will wind up the National Hockey League season with a new record for goals.

The right-wing star, nicknamed Boom-Boom because of the echo his shot makes when it hits the backboards, has scored 18 goals in the 24 games Montreal has played. If he keeps producing at the same rate for the rest of the 70-game season, he will have 52 goals—two more than the record set in the 1944-45 season by teammate Maurice Richard over a 50-game schedule.

Geoffrion's best season to date was in 1951-52 when he scored 30 goals and won the Calder Memorial Trophy as the league's top rookie. He scored 22 goals the next year and added 29 more last season.

Geoffrion, Richard, Jean Beliveau and Ken Mosdell continued Montreal's domination of the scoring race during the last week's play.

Geoffrion heads the pack with 28 points, followed by Richard and Beliveau with 24 each. Richard has 12 goals and 12 assists and Beliveau 10 and 14.

Veteran Mosdell, last year's all-star centre, is in fourth place with 20 points on 12 goals and eight assists. Danny Lewicki of New York, making the comeback of the year after a dismal season with Toronto last year, is tied with teammate Don Raleigh for fifth place with 18 points. Lewicki has 14 goals and four assists and Raleigh three goals and 15 assists.

TOP PLAYER
Nick Mickoski, traded by New York to Chicago last week is the league's top playmaker with 16 assists. He holds down seventh place in the standings with 17 points.

Alex Delvecchio is next with 16 points on three goals and 13 assists. Tied for ninth place are Sid Smith of Toronto, Leo Labine of Boston and Calum Mackay of Montreal, each with 15 points.

Labine made the most sensational advance of the week, scoring seven points to move from 33rd to ninth place.

Goalie Harry Lumley of Toronto leads the Vezina Trophy race with 38 goals against him in 22 games for an average of 1.72 per game. Terry Sawchuk of Detroit is second with 40 goals against him and a 1.90

average. Sawchuk leads the league in shutouts with six, four more than either Lumley or John Henderson of Boston.

Fern Flaman of Boston is the league's most penalized player with 48 minutes in penalties. The leaders:

Ketchikan High School coach Bill Martineson will rely heavily on seniors when the Alaskan students invade Prince Rupert this Thursday for a two-game series with Booth Memorial High School's Rainmakers.

Four of Kayhi's starters will be from the senior class while the fifth will be a 6 foot 3 inch freshman, Hutse by name. Other starters will be Vincent and Tucker, both an even 6 feet, Auger, 5 foot 10 inches and Walters 6 foot 2 1/2 inches.

Major League Executives Plot Player Trades At Minors' Meet

HOUSTON (AP)—The fuss and confusion created today by the American Association's drafting of the western league's Denver club have all but blotted out the existence of the major league managers at the minors' 53rd annual convention.

But while weary and sometimes short-tempered executives were frantically seeking a solution to the many problems looming ahead because of the imminent wholesale realignment of teams, big league pilots were quietly plotting player trades.

One due to be announced at any moment now is the second half of the Baltimore-New York Yankee transaction of two weeks ago. The second installment probably will send Oriole pitchers Lou Kretlow and Mike Blyzka, outfielder, Jim Fridley, catcher Derrell Johnson, first baseman Dick Kryhoski and an unnamed farmhand to the Yankees for pitcher Bill Miller and infielders Kal Segrist and Don Leppert.

That would make an 18-player deal of the one which began with the shifting of shortstop Billy Hunter and pitchers Bob Turley and Don Larsen to the Yankees for pitchers Harry Byrd and Jim McDonald, outfielder Gene Woodling, shortstop Willie Miranda and catchers Gus Triandos and Hal Smith.

There is no doubt more trade winds are blowing behind closed doors and private nooks in the rooms and in the lobbies of the hotel headquarters. One involves Brooklyn and Philadelphia.

General manager Roy Hamey of the Phillies, openly admitting he is seeking hitting help, reportedly has made bids for Jackie Robinson, Carl Furillo and Junior Gilliam. The Dodgers have asked for southpaw Curt Simmons and either of the Phil's two catchers, Smokey Burgess and Stan Lopata, but not for the trio coveted by Hamey.

BOMBER GOAT
In 1947, it was Bob Sandberg of Winnipeg Blue Bombers. Argonauts beat Winnipeg on Joe Krol's punt that landed as the gun sounded. It was set up when Sandberg gambled on a third-down plunge at his own 33 with seconds remaining. Sandberg called a fake kick. Bert Tannone tried a plunge but he was stopped at the line of scrimmage. Argos took over possession and Krol's last-play kick gave them a 10-0 victory.

A fumble made Orville Burke the goat in 1930. Burke, who hadn't fumbled all season, dropped a punt by Art Stevenson of Winnipeg at the Ottawa 45. Jeff Nicklin, later killed in the Second World War, picked up the ball and ran 10 yards to the 35.

Stevenson punted to Will Tremblay behind the Ottawa goal line and Tremblay's return kick went off the side of his foot and out of touch of the Ottawa eight. Stevenson boomed the ball into the crowd on first down on the game's final play and Bombers won their second title 8-7.

The 1948 final was unique apart from Karpuk's lapse. The whole Ottawa team wasn't too sharp that afternoon. In the first half the Stamps pulled the hairy old sleeper play—and it worked for Calgary's first touchdown.

Two Thousand Cheering Fans Gather To Welcome Grey Cup Champions Home

EDMONTON (AP)—Two thousand pennant-waving fans hollered a raucous pre-dawn welcome today as the Grey Cup champion Edmonton Eskimos hobbled off their plane from Toronto.

The team's special Trans-Canada Air Lines North Star was surrounded even before its engines stopped by wildly-cheering fans who knocked a heavy wire gate 20 feet from its hinges to penetrate a police cordon and crowd the plane ramp.

The players, each in natty polo coats and big western hats, responded drowsily to the individual cheers of high school cheerleaders who set up a chorus of specially-written victory songs.

Biggest ovation went to Jackie Parker, Mississippi State back who counted the winning touchdown with an 85-yard gallop. Rollic Miles, Negro seatback who played two quarters with staved

in ribs; and Eagle Keys, burly centre who snapped for three quarters despite a broken leg.

Keys probably got the biggest welcome as he grasped his crutches in one hand and hopped down the ramp on his one good leg.

It took the players nearly 20 minutes to make their way through the crowd and into a terminal room to meet their wives and children.

Coach Frank Pop Ivy mumbled "Wonderful, Wonderful" as he elbowed through the maze of well-wishers and later told reporters that his boys were still "pretty well awed by the whole thing."

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
