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### Angostura Bitters' Formula 131-Year-Old Family Secret

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, where rum gets to work in the (Reuters)—Few people who drink cocktails flavored with angostura bitters realize that the aromatic dashes in their drinks are the product of one of the best family secrets in history.

The man who started the business, Dr. J. G. Siegert, served as an army surgeon in the Second Prussian Infantry at Waterloo. He arrived in Venezuela in 1820.

Dr. Siegert produced in 1824, aromatic bitters which he intended as a harmless stimulant for the appetite and to relieve the many minor stomach complaints in the tropics.

He gave his bitters the name of the town of Angostura.
