Shorter Work Week Soon For Government Employees

OTTAWA — About 100,000 civil servants will go on a 37½-hour week the day after Parliament prorogues, the civil service commission announced today.

The work week is being reduced by about 50 minutes for the 100,000 office workers, about 20,000 of them in the capital. For those on a five-day-week—about 80 per cent of the civil service—the new schedule means a reduction of 10 minutes in the working day.

"The commission said in its announcement that this establishes 7½ hours as the normal working day and "confirms the prevailing practice in business and industry."

At the end of March, the strength of the civil service was reported at about 161,000 including hourly-paid workers, casuals and ships crews.

The commission's announcement said for those not on a five-day-week, it is expected the adjustment will be made by rearranging Saturday hours, leaving the seven-hour day which prevails Monday to Friday intact.

For those not on a five-day week, Saturday hours likely will be cut to 3½ hours with the summer five-day week being extended to 15 weeks from five.

Heavy Seas Lone Factor Delaying Swim

FOLKESTONE, England — Heavy seas breaking on the French coast today jeopardized Marilyn Bell's assault on the English Channel, scheduled for early Friday.

As the 17-year-old Toronto swimmer took a last loosening-up dip in an outdoor pool, her veteran English pilot, John Burwill, scanned meteorological reports on Channel conditions.

A stiff western offshore breeze during the last two days has sent heavy breakers crashing along the French coast. Marilyn and her party were scheduled to cross the Channel late today to begin the swim from Cap Gris Nez, France.

"Weather is the only thing that can stop her now," said a spokesman for the Bell party. "She's used to the cold water, she's swum longer distances and she's in 100-per-cent condition. But big waves or fog could force postponement."
