## Communist Revolt

WHILE Poland's break from Soviet dictatorship is by itself an event of tremendous importance, it may well be that even more critical developments affecting the USSR are yet to come.

The people to be watched now are the Russians themselves. The satellite rebellion against the leaders in Moscow is certain to have domestic repercussions among the masses who so far have been given to believe that their government can do no wrong. Already bewilderment must exist over the rejection of Stalin as a Communist idol, and now comparatively small countries outside have become bold enough to reject those presently in power.

The vision of government by supreme beings who are beyond reproof or error is being steadily destroyed. The supermen are being brought to earth where their human frailties are in danger of being exposed as never before. The success of a dictatorship depends not only on a strong police arm but also on an impression of infallibility. With things as they are, the men in the Kremlin are going to have difficulty keeping that impression alive.

The terrible fact about the Russian system of government is that there is no room for human consideration. Stalin was a monstrous example of humanity whose cruelty probably was never duplicated even among the Mongol hordes which at one time ravaged Asia and which in all likelihood included his ancestors. His instrument of power was fear, and he made it work.

But Stalin's awful gifts died with him, and his successors have inherited a rule which cannot function under any other condition. They must establish themselves as men of steel, which they are not. Knowing the pretence is too much for them, they have tried to discard it only to find they have inherited something even more unwelcome—the resentment of nations who suffered from Stalin's fearful methods but refused to be destroyed by them.

No doubt this resentment also shoulders within the boundaries of Russia itself. With other countries setting the example, it may be just a matter of time before it bursts into flame.

## Stevenson Quips

ACCORDING to news reports from the United States, Adlai Stevenson isn't using the humorous quip in this campaign as much as he did in 1952.

That may be so, but we like this one, from his speech on farm policy at the national plowing contest.

Stevenson began by expressing sympathy for the Iowans who were in the state delegation to the Republican National Convention at San Francisco. It seems they wanted to take with them stalks of Iowa corn to carry in a demonstration. They were prevented from doing so by California officials who feared the introduction of corn borers, an agricultural pest.

"As far as I know," said Stevenson, "that's the only corn that wasn't at the convention, and these were the only borers that didn't get in."

## As I See It

## • Modern Chinese Hospitals

PEIPING, China—Yesterday I visited the brand new Sick Children's Hospital. It is as modern as anything we have in Canada.

I was met at the door by the head of the hospital, Dr. Chue Fu-tang, and after the inevitable welcoming cups of tea, was shown over the whole admirable new institution by the associate director, Dr. Wu Jui-Puli.

Both these fine children's specialists were graduated by the original Rockefeller medical centre in Peiping which was closed down by the Japanese.

Later, they ran a small private children's hospital until the present institution was financed by the Peiping municipal authority in 1952.

It took about two years to build, equip and get into full operation.

Now, as I saw for myself, it is humbling with activity, doing what must surely be satisfying a job as any on the face of this earth—that is, making sick children well, and better still, preventing well children from getting ill.

The buildings themselves are spacious, and are of grey brick, of attractive architectural design. The windows are steel-framed. The capacity of the hospital is 800 beds, of which 460 are installed now. In addition, there are facilities for treatment of 800 out-patients daily—with 1,200 the ultimate planned load.

There are two other clinics run in connection with this hospital, making the total number of out-patients treated daily 1,500.

In accordance with the deliberate national policy of the present government of China, the hospital combines and harmonizes the two types of medical science formerly practised in China.

## HAIR-FINE NEEDLE USED

There are 120 Western-style doctors on the staff of the Peiping Children's Hospital, but, in addition, there are eight traditional-type Chinese doctors.

The patients themselves pay nominal fees for their treatment.

However, all government employees are entitled to free treatment, paid for out of their own welfare plan, and so are many other trade union groups.

Any hospital is a fascinating place to me—and children's most of all. But because I had never before seen the traditional type of Chinese medicine in action, I found it even more interesting than the other style.

The patients themselves ask for whichever style treatment they prefer. Some change their minds, and their doctors. About four-fifths choose Western style, but the rest prefer the ancient Chinese remedies.

I saw one young Chinese doctor giving the so-called aqua puncture or needle treatment to one black-eyed, bonny youngster, who was not batting an eyelash as the hair-fine steel needle pricked the skin in her polio-stricken legs. The needle is so fine, and the doctor so skillful, that it does not even draw blood.

Apparently the theory is that

the hair-fine needle prick stimulates the nerves and so speeds the healing process.

In any event, Dr. Wu, who, of course, practices Western-style medicine, assured me that in some types of polo and sleeping sickness the traditional Chinese doctors do actually get better results than their Western colleagues.

The same thing holds true in

regard to some types of pneumonia, where penicillin and some of the Chinese herbal medicines are now sometimes used side-by-side in the same hospital.

The very fact that it has such

a long way to go is itself the greatest advantage in the field of medical science. The results already achieved speak for themselves.



## Ordered to Halt Fixing of Prices

WASHINGTON 4—Fishermen and vessel owners in the Puget Sound area of Washington State have been ordered by the U.S. Trade Commission to halt the fixing of salmon prices.

The commission's order is directed against Local 3 of the Fishermen's and Allied Workers division of the International Longshoremen and Warehousemen's Union, Seattle, and the Puget Seine Vessel Owners Association, Tacoma.

Thirteen canners named in the commission's original complaint accepted a consent order last March prohibiting price-fixing activity.

The order prohibits the union and the vessel owners from entering into "working agreements" or "salmon agreements" designed to fix the price of raw or fresh salmon and from interfering with the operation of any fishing vessel for the purpose of maintaining any price-fixing agreement.
