

CITY COUNCIL BRIEFS

Prized Totem Given City By Metlakatla Pioneers

City Council is the proud possessor of a meticulously carved totem pole. The totem was a presentation from 81-year-old Casper Mather who along with two other founders of the Indian settlement at New Metlakatla Alaska, arrived in the city last week for a "last look around" before returning to their home.

Mayor George E. Hills accepted the gift on behalf of the city and the result of a motion from Alderman A. Donald Ritchie the colorful pole will be placed in a glass case along with an account of the historical significance of the carving.

John Gurvich has been granted a One-Car Taxi Zone on the north side of Sixth Street fronting his taxi stand known as 32 Taxi.

Council agreed to a finance committee's recommendation that the city make no grant to the 1956 Grey Cup Festivities.

Aldermen T. Norton Youngs and Michael Krueger have been appointed along with Mayor Hills to meet November 10 as a court of revision for the municipal voter's list. Non-property owners wishing to ensure that their names are on the voters' list may call at the city hall, tender \$2 and be registered. They will be returned their \$2.

Police have no information at all on the hit and run case. Mayor Hills told council in reply to a query from Alderman S. J. Dominato.

Work has started on repairs to the Department of Transport hangar at Seal Cove which was battered by heavy winds and heavy lashed in the gale which lashed the city Saturday. The hangar, which is leased by the city to Canadian Pacific Airlines, is covered by insurance.

Superintendent of Works C. J. Gupton will prepare a report on cost of installing a sidewalk from Fifth and Sixth Avenues on Taylor Street on summer apartment side.

Alderman Ritchie told council that the children walk all over the road since there is no sidewalk and when the road is slippery it presents a hazard to children.

A move to have Telephone Superintendent A. E. Jones report on the advisability of installing pay phones at the Seal Cove airport in both the Pacific Western Airlines and Canadian Pacific Airlines departments, was instituted by Alderman T. Norton Youngs.

Mr. Youngs said that passengers getting off the planes were inconvenienced by the lack of telephone facilities, there being only one phone in each repetitive office.

Permission was granted the Canadian Legion, No. 27, of the British Empire Service League to hold the annual Poppy Day November 10 with sales on city streets.

Prince Rupert Civic Employees' Federal Union Local 5 has advised of the authorization of the change of name to Prince Rupert Civic Employees' Local Union, No. 5, a letter from the Labor Relations Board stated.

Dominion Bureau of Statistics has announced the population of Prince Rupert as 10,381 persons. This is an increase of almost 2,000 persons since the last census was taken in 1951. Clerk-Comptroller R. W. Long reported the enumerators' estimates tallied with those of the city's.
