Unrest Follows Arrest Of Five Algerian Rebels

ALGIERS (AP) — Angry demonstrations flared in the streets of Tunis today and unrest spread elsewhere in North Africa in the wake of the French seizure of five leading Algerian rebels.

The surprise arrest dimmed hopes of the "peace in Algeria" meeting in Tunis between Sultan Mohammed V of Morocco and Premier Habib Bourguiba of Tunisia.

Labor leaders called general protest strikes in Tunisia and Casablanca, and the movement is expected to spread elsewhere in turbulent North Africa.

Police in Tunis turned back several thousand screaming demonstrators who attempted to march on government buildings.

The French seizure transformed the atmosphere of the proposed conference into a council of war rather than any meeting

aimed at bringing peace to Algeria.

The Algerian rebels were captured during flight to a national rendezvous aimed at a possible North African union.

Capture of the Algerians was made possible by the French pilot of an airliner, who duped them into thinking they were landing on friendly soil. It evoked bitter protests from both Tunis and Rabat.

Big prize for the French was Ahmed Ben Bella, veteran nationalist who has been masterminding the insurgent movement from sanctuary provided by Egypt.

In Paris, Premier Guy Mollet summoned his cabinet for a brief emergency night session and scheduled another today. Mollet is due to ask parliament soon for a vote of confidence on his government's policies in Algeria.

Eisenhower To Undergo Thorough Check

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower will undergo a complete physical examination this weekend, the results of which may have an influence on the November 6 U.S. election.

Eisenhower said in August he planned a pre-election test of his health and would report promptly to the people if it showed him unfit for a second term.

James C. Hagerty, presidential press secretary, told reporters Monday that Eisenhower's health is "fine" right now.

Meanwhile, debate raged to-day in the wake of the Russian proposal for an agreement to end nuclear tests. Eisenhower denounced Premier Bulganin's Sunday as an attempt to meddle in U.S. internal affairs and as a violation of usual diplomatic procedures.

REPLY "UNFORTUNATE"

Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee, said he shared Eisenhower's presentation at the manner and timing of the Soviet message, but called the American reply "unfortunate."

"The real issue is not Mr. Bulganin's manners or Russian news about American politics," Stevenson said. "It was what could be done to save the world from hydrogen disaster."

Defender Can Stop A Marked Finesse

On rare occasions, an alert defender has the opportunity to prevent declarer from taking a marked finesse. In today's deal Mr. Champion opened the jack of hearts against Mr. Abel's three no trump contract.

Mr. Abel elected to win with the queen on the board. With the spade suit practically wide open and only six top winners, things didn't look too good. He led a club from dummy and finessed the ten.

RIGHT PLAY

Mr. Abel could have made his contract by playing differently at trick one, regardless of the subsequent defense. The right play was a little hard to see and somewhat beyond Mr. Abel's capabilities, although Mr. Heinlein, naturally, described it as "automatic." It was to win the first trick with dummy's ace of hearts and to drop the king from the closed hand.

When this held, the prospect was a little brighter. However, if Mrs. Keen had at least three small clubs with her king, it would be necessary to finesse clubs twice more to realize four tricks in the suit. And that meant finding two more entries to dummy.

Mr. Abel figured that if Mr. Champion's heart holding included the 10 (as seemed likely from the opening lead), then he could lead his small heart and finesse dummy's nine. Later the lead of the king of hearts to dummy's ace would furnish another entry.

He led the low heart. But Mr. Champion had other ideas. He promptly played the 10. It took dummy's ace to win this—and now the hope for two heart entries.

Czechs Told To Be on Guard In Canada

MONTREAL (T) — Czech-Canadians were warned here at the weekend "to be on guard against Red agents who may try to intimidate you."

Crowds of Russians thronged the government-operated newsstands Monday to buy copies of the journal published by the U.S. information service, on sale for the first time.

Moscow Radio announced America's appearance. Fifteen thousand copies were sold out in Moscow within an hour and another 10,000 will be put on sale today. Under a Soviet-American agreement, Russia is permitted to distribute a Soviet magazine in the U.S. in return for allowing distribution of 50,000 copies of America.

America, lavishly illustrated and containing features about American life, will be distributed monthly in 81 Russian cities.

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
