'THIS time of year one frequently sees, the Canso aircraft that shuttles between here and Sandspit making two trips a day in an effort to keep up with the demands for its service. While one planeload of passeagers waits at Sandspit for a couple of hours, the Canso picks up or discharges another load at Prince Rupert.

It is part of the cumbersome but unavoidable system reauired in flying passengers between here and Vancouver and is one of the more noticeably inconvenient results of not having an airport readily accessible to Prince Rupert where the larger landbased aircraft con operate.

For a long ture the shuttle service was tolerated with reasonably good grace because Prince Rupert continued to be served at frequent intervals throughout the week by coastal passenger vessels. Those who sought comfort and were not pressed for time always had this alternative means of travel.

But the time when these ships arrived in port almost any day one cared to name has passed. First the "Prince Rupert" disappeared from service and then the "Prince George" followed suit, except for summer excursion trips. The city still has good connections with the south by water but, without the additional and busier service by air, they would be entirely insufficient to handle the demands of passenger traffic in and out of this district.

The days of the obsolete Canso are numbered. When it is no longer possible to reach Sandspit by this means Prince Rupert will have to turn to Terrace, about the same distance away but connected by a road that is often impassable. In addition, the elevated Terrace airport is more subject to adverse weather conditions than sea-level Sandspit, so that air travel out of here will be made more difficult than ever.

The needs of the district do not call for an airport of overly ambitious proportions and are not likely to do so for some time to come. All commercial aircraft operating on this coast can land and take off with room, to spare on a 5,000-foot runway, which is approximately the length of the runways at Sandspit, Por Hardy and Victoria. 




