

CANADA REPLACING EUROPE

In his report at the company's 35th annual general meeting, King said Scandinavia at one time supplied the bull: of British-consumed newsprint, Now production in Norway and Sweden was limited by reforestation needs and Finland might not want to become too dependent on the British market.

"If we could ever get back to our pre-war consumption, the additional paper or pulp would have to come mainly from Canada."

Relations with Canadian newsprint manufacturers were of the happiest but as long as Britain's dollar difficulties remained "so long will uncertainty hang over the supply of our vital raw material."


