Lifetime Trip In Store For Student

Some deserving Booth Memorial High school student is in for a trip of a lifetime this summer when the winner of the Odd Fellows lodge public speaking contest wins a spot in the United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth.

The tour is arranged by the Odd Fellows and Rebekah lodges throughout the United States and Canada and in the Sixth annual tour students from British Columbia, Washington and Oregon will take part.

Between July 8 and August 3, the representatives from all the various schools will travel by bus from Spokane, Wash., up through Alberta and across to Ottawa for a visit to the Canadian capital. They will progress to Quebec City and Montreal and then down to New York.

They will see the Catskill Mountains in Albany, the Franklin Delano Roosevelt estate, the Hudson River Valley and the big city of New York itself.

The trip which lasts five weeks includes a seven-day stop in New York from July 17-23, and will afford the young pilgrims a chance to observe the United Nations groups in action. They will visit International House where students of 70 countries live and will interview United Nations officials and delegates from various member countries.

Delegates must be from either Grades 10 or 11, must be 16 years of age and not over 18. Candidates take part in an essay-writing and a public speaking contest. Other qualifications which are equally important, are character, personality, scholastic ability, school, community and civic mindedness, leadership, church participation and interest in world affairs.

The marks for the essay and speaking account for less than 40 per cent of the marks to be obtained. Selection of candidates is to be made as fairly as possible. Each individual applicant will be given a number and that number will remain with the boy or girl until the final analysis is made. The selection committee (outside the IOOF) will rate the speaking contest. This is not an elimination contest. It is pointed out, but merely a selection of the student who the judges feel is adequate for the job of going to see the United Nations and able to return to Prince Rupert to describe what they have seen in a capable and intelligent manner.

The team, and its coach Mr. Don Hartwig deserve congratulations for a remarkable display of skill and dilliance on the court.
