Minister blames Churches Low Standard Not Indian Fault

· ParVICTORIA (CP)—A Vancouver Island clergyman Priday blamed churches for the low! standard of living of native Indians in B.C.

The charge was made by Rey. Peter Kelly of Nanaimo, wellknown Indian authority, who told a legislative committee that the influence of the churches j had robbed Indians of their "in-)

"I blame the churches, I blame my own church, the United Church of Canada . . . the Meth-! odists; and Presbyterians, Anglicans and the Roman Catholic church," he said.

"It was the desire of the? churches to be helpful but they! did not ask the Indian people to do as much for themselves as they should have done," Mr. Kelly said.
