However, he is still a tough pitcher to get around.

G & A played without Ralph Enridge, their sledge gun, but they didn't need his services too much. Darrell Young took over the clean-up spot and drove in the first two runs for his team and was ever dangerous the rest of the way. Don and Syd Scherk also connected for some timely hits as did little Billy Smith, who drove a ball over Don Hawryluk's head when Don played him too shallow in left.

The Hotelmen seem to start out O.K. but die off in the latter stages of the game. At first they seem to be making an effort to get on base with sharp line drives and invariably they score a couple of runs and get the ball rolling. After that, they try to knock the ball out of the park, and a good part of the time, the ball doesn't get out of the infield. When they do get hold of the ball, the outfielders are stationed near the boards to gather in these long-outs with little or no trouble. Nick Pavlikis is an exception, he takes his eyes off the fence and drives the ball through the infield with regularity and also gets his share of runs batted in.

If the protest is upheld, we will have to get this game replayed, but if it is thrown out, then G & A are assured of a tie for the league lead and next Tuesday's game with Esquires could see them take the league title. Brooklyn Formula Wins For Braves

It took Milwaukee nearly four years to learn the formula that has won so many pennants for Brooklyn Dodgers but now that the Braves finally appear to have solved it they're going to be tougher than ever to dislodge from their lofty first-place perch.

What is this pennant formula? It's the ability to pound the daylight out of the opposition on home ground.

The Braves Sunday climaxed their most successful home stand since they moved to Milwaukee by sweeping a doubleheader from Philadelphia 8-7 and 16-3. Those twin victories not only boosted their National League lead to three games over Cincinnati but gave them a record of 15 triumphs in a 20-game home stand for a .830 record at Milwaukee.

The Dodgers took two from St. Louis 5-3 and 4-3, but remained six games behind Milwaukee although they moved to within three lengths of the Redlegs who were held to a split by Pittsburgh. The Redlegs pounded two home runs to defeat the Pirates 9-2 in the nightcap after Pittsburgh had won the opener 8-0.

Chicago's Cubs climbed into sixth place past the Phillies by downing New York Giants twice 4-1 and 2-1.

New York Yankee's first-place American League margin over Cleveland was reduced to ½ game when they divided a doubleheader with Kansas City while the Indians were defeating Baltimore 8-0 in a single game. After Kansas City had won the opener 7-4, the Yankees came back to win the second game 13-4. In single affairs, Boston out-slugged Detroit 8-6 and Chicago White Sox subdued Washington 6-1. Hotelmen's bid in the piping to tie the five runs held by the opposition fell short by one run as a result of the ruling as an


Swim Star Saves Boy

INSIDE BASEBALL for Little Leaguers



Knowing the difference between a strike and a ball often means the difference between being a good and a bad hitter. Duke Snider was a "strikeout king" until he spent many hours of extra practice watching hundreds of pitches in spring training. When he learned to quit swinging at pitches above his arm pits he became a standout slugger.

Other batters may have trouble with low pitches or those inside or outside. You must find out what pitch fools you and then concentrate on passing up that pitch if it is outside the strike zone.

Once you learn to judge good pitches, keep in mind that a full swing is essential to success as a batter. Don't lunge at the ball or swing so hard that you end up off balance, but do be sure that you follow through with your bat and body like the players shown in the illustrations above.
