VANCOUVER P-More than 7,500 British Columbia carponters will domand a record 73 to 75 cents an hour in wage increases, and other benefits in forthcoming negotiations with

employers, a union official said Friday. A spokesman for Local 452 of the United Brotherhood of Curponters and Joiners said the increase, if taken in easing would make the wages the highest in the Canadian construction industry-\$3 an hour.

About 3,000 eurpontors on the B.C. lower mainland who now earn \$2.25 an hour will ask for a 75-cent increase, he sald, The remaining 4,500 in outlying areas, who earn \$2,20,

The union official said the earpenters may agree to take ! part of the increase in the form of a relaction in work hours. increase in the number of statutory holidays, and employer payments into a health and wolfare plan.
