

Habs Defeat Leafs 8-1

Day Not Perturbed By Lumley's Game

Sure the score was 8-1 for Montreal Canadiens Thursday night. But before you start castigating Toronto goalie Harry Lumley, ponder this.

Lumley had just returned to the nets after sitting out 11 national hockey league games with a thigh injury, and the Leaf team was below the form it showed while Ed Chadwick substituted in the five preceding games.

Leaf general manager "Hap" Day said he was neither upset nor disappointed by the flow of goals.

"There were only two of them that Lumley had any chance against," he said.

Lumley was a surprise starter, replacing the rookie Chadwick, who had registered two shutouts and allowed only three goals while filling in. Chadwick was called up from Winnipeg, Warriors of the Western Hockey League as a replacement for Gilt Mayer, the previous sub for the injured Lumley.

Just before game time Lumley told Day he was "100 per cent recovered."

Chadwick, who was on emergency recall, will fly back to Winnipeg today unless Leafs pull another switch.

Maurice Richard and brother Henri each fired a pair of goals and set up two more. Jean Beliveau, the league's leading scorer, got a goal and an assist. Dickie Moore, Claude Provost and Bert Olmstead completed the massacre.

Tod Sloan spoiled Jacques Plante's bid for his eighth shut-out with a goal early in the third period.

The win moved Canadiens who have 80 points, 17 points ahead of second-place New York Rangers. Leafs, with 48 points, are 12 behind third-place Detroit Red Wings and four ahead of Boston Bruins, who are in fifth spot.

Chicago Black Hawks are last with 43 points.

Bruins visit Chicago in the only game tonight.

Lack of Team Co-Operation Sees Dynamiter Coach Quit

Norman Larson, for three years playing coach of the Kimberley Dynamiters of the Western International Hockey League, Thursday hand in his resignation.

Larson, 35, who plays centre on the cellar-dwelling, team quit because "the boys wouldn't play hockey with me."

"The team has been losing badly," he said. "Maybe the boys will play better for someone else."

Dynamiters have been in the basement of the league since the season began and now are more than 10 points away from third place.

Larson said he has no immediate plans in hockey. Club officials said former coach Johnny Achzeneg, who guided the Dynamiters to an Allan Cup in 1935, will take over for the rest of the season. League standings see Spokane Flyers three games in front of Trail, with Nelson hot behind in third place.

In the OSHL, Penticton is the centre of a squabble between hockey club officials and the Parks Board, operators of the Memorial Arena—home of the Vs.

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
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Former Alberta Champion To Represent Province Again at High School Finals

LETHBRIDGE, Alta. — Three years ago a shy but confident 16-year-old from Vulcan skipped his rink to victory in the Alberta high school curling championships and represented the province in the Canadian final at Saskatoon.

Today Barry Coleman, now 19 and quickly confident, is once more the province's color-bearer in the Canadian final—this time at the helm of a Lethbridge foursome.

Third in the 1953 finals, Coleman is looking for better things with his newly-formed quartet which will compete at Fort William Feb. 20-24.

VALUABLE EXPERIENCE
"I think I gained invaluable experience by taking part in the finals before and will have the advantage over skips, who haven't participated in Canadian playoffs," Coleman said after winning the provincial title at Calgary.

Coleman moved to Lethbridge from Vulcan, a small town about 65 miles south of Calgary, in 1954 when his father, a school teacher, resigned because of ill health.

He didn't bring any of his previous teammates—Ron Northcott, Warren Banks and Bill Hansell—who since have split up.

His current crew didn't curl as a unit until last December. Second Bob Everson, 17, and lead Scott Henderson, 16, had been curling together before they were joined by third Frank Boal, 16, two seasons ago. Coleman met them at Lethbridge Collegiate Institute.

Both Everson and Henderson have been tossing rocks for six years while Boal has three years behind him.

Coleman's father won the second event of the Foothills bonspiel in 1952 and the third event of the 1953 Vulcan bonspiel. Barry played lead for his father in the Vulcan competition.
