

Voting for Good Citizen Set For Second Week in February

Third annual voting for the Alex Hunter Good Citizen Award sponsored by the Prince Rupert Junior Chamber of Commerce will start February 7, the award committee decided at a recent meeting.

Prince Rupert residents will have the opportunity during the second week in February of nominating the person they consider did the most for Prince Rupert during 1954. Nomination forms will be published in The Daily News during that time and these together with names submitted by representatives of the judging committee will form the basis from which the Good Citizen is chosen.

The judging committee is formed of representatives from ten city organizations, the Mineral Association, the Catholic Church, the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council, the Prince Rupert Fishermen's Cooperative Association, Local 708 of the International Brotherhood of Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers, the Senior Chamber of Commerce, the Gyro Club, the IODE and the Parent Teachers Council and the Jaycees.

Names of the four top candidates will be announced late in February and on March 2, the four will be the guests of honor

at a banquet at which time the 1954 Good Citizen will be announced, and the award made.

The award was evolved in 1953 by the Junior Chamber of Commerce to honor the former editor of The Daily News, the late Alex Hunter, who was known for his tireless efforts in working for the good of the community.

Mr. Hunter who was with The Daily News for 35 years was killed May 10, 1952 in an accident at Keno Bay.

Chairman of the award committee Fred Aston, said that organizations will be sent invitations to the award banquet and open invitations will be extended to anyone in the city. Invitations can be obtained from the Jaycees.

Watching Ambitions Achieved Big Thrill to Retiring Dean

TORONTO — Marion E. Ferguson, dean of women at University College, who ruled two generations of women students with a firm but benevolent hand, retires this term after 24 years service.

She is the third dean of women since the college, an affiliate of the University of Toronto, was established.

Native of Galt, Ont., and interested in young people took Miss Ferguson from teaching to YWCA work in Burma and Ceylon and on to her present post.

During the First World War as a student at the University of Toronto she was the only woman picked to go to the Far East as a "Y" recruit. She studied two years in Ceylon before becoming general secretary in Rangoon for five years.

INTERESTING STUDENT

Known popularly as "Feigey" she often mixed social work with her college duties. Among all her students she remembers best the first West Indian student ever admitted to Whitney Hall, the college's women's residence.


The student's name was Eugenia and she arrived by plane with no educational credentials but her name in a newspaper clipping to show she graduated from high school. She had no acceptance from the university.

University authorities gave her an adult-to-lectures card and enrolled her in honor law.


