

Rupert Sweeps Twin-Bill

All-Stars Defeat Terrace 6-5, 8-2

Prince Rupert Senior Men's Softball All-Stars swept both ends of an afternoon-evening exhibition double-header with Terrace yesterday at Algoma park, edging the visitors 6-5 in 10 innings in the opener, and winning 8-2 in the seven-inning nightcap.

In the extra-inning affair, Rupert catcher Dan Bartko broke a 5-5 deadlock, driving in Bill Mar-

back with the winning run after Terrace had evened the score with a two-run rally in the eighth.

Windmiller Lou Franta of Terrace held the All-Stars hitless and scoreless for four innings while his team mates chalked up a three-run lead.

TOOK OVER LEAD

All-Stars made the score 3-2 in the fifth and went ahead 5-3 with a three-run rally in the seventh.

Rupert batters got to Franta for seven hits, including a pair of doubles by Vern Hurley in his five trips to the plate. The Terrace hurler issued five walks and struck out 12.

Winning hurler was Jim Leniuk who allowed eight hits, one walk and struck out eight. Catcher Bert Seeley with a double and two singles in five appearances topped Terrace batters.

LED ALL THE WAY

In the second game, Rupert built up a five-run lead before the visitors got on the scoreboard with their only two runs in the bottom of the fourth on two of the three hits winning hurler Stu Taylor allowed Terrace batters.

The All-Stars added a singleton in the fifth and two runs in the seventh, one of which was a long drive under cars parked in centre field by Rupert centre-fielder Bill Marback which went for a home run.

Taylor handcuffed the visitors from the fourth on, giving up no hits and striking out the side in the fifth.

DISAPPEARING FIELDER

Fielding gem of the night was turned in by Terrace left fielder Stan Konopaski, who pulled Marback's high fly ball down before dropping out of sight in the left field ditch to end the top of the fourth on a soggy note.

Third baseman Ed Gillis with a single and Seeley with two safeties were the only Terrace hitters.

In his seven-inning stint, Taylor gave up five walks and struck out nine.

Flaherty, the loser, scattered five hits, allowed five walks and fanned nine.

In league play Saturday, Pete Merson pitched Atlin to a 16-0 win over Canifco to move Atlin to within 2½ half games of league-leading Savoy Hotel.

Carl Erickson was the loser, giving way to Art Helli in the top of the fourth and coming back into the game in the top of the ninth.

Terrace moved into second place in the Prince Rupert and district Senior baseball standings by sweeping both ends of a double-header with Esquires yesterday.

G & A led all the way in the nine-inning opener as Ian Dunbar won his fifth game in six starts. The hardwaremen led off with three runs in the first frame on a home run by shortstop Bill Sundberg and a double by catcher Don Scherk and a single by right-fielder Darrel Young.

Hotelmens made the score 3-2 in their first but went scoreless five innings while G & A added three runs to stay ahead of a three-run Hotelmen rally in the seventh.



Harris Rumored Out As Tiger's Manager

DETROIT (UPI) — Stanley W. (Bucky) Harris may be on his way out as manager of Detroit Tigers.

The club has nosedived from the first division to sixth place with an eight-game losing streak, longest of the season in the American League. Walter O. (Spike) Briggs, Jr., Tigers' youthful president, has been openly critical of what he terms lack of hustle and spirit.

Briggs said in an interview that he would "make a change right now" if the baseball company's ownership were not in such a muddled state.

Announcing he is "fed up" with Tigers' showing, Briggs said the club should be in fifth, and per-

haps fourth place. Tigers dropped their seventh and eighth games Sunday by 3-2 scores to Baltimore Orioles.

Harris, who has a one-year contract with Detroit, has produced just three pennant winners in a major league managerial career dating back to 1924, when he was installed as the "boy manager" of Washington Nationals.

Briggs Jr. hired Harris before the 1955 season after Bucky had been let out at Washington. Tigers wound up in fifth place, 17 games behind the pennant-winning New York Yankees. Detroit has not finished in the first division since 1950, when Red Rolfe led the club to second place.

INSIDE BASEBALL for Little Leaguers

Being in the right place at the right time usually makes the double play possible. The famous double-play combinations such as Marion and Schoenlein, Boudreau and Gordon, Crosetti and Lazzeri, and Carrasquel and Fox spent many hours in practicing their specialty and studying how to play certain batters.

In getting set for a double play the shortstop and second baseman move toward second base and home plate from their normal fielding depth. How far they move depends on the speed of the runner at first base and of the batter. Only practice and experience will determine the proper distance.

If the ball is fielded by the shortstop or second baseman more than 15 feet from second base, he should throw the ball overhand to the pivot man. He should throw hard, but not too hard for the pivot man to handle, and he should be sure that it is a good throw, aimed at the chest. A poor throw can keep the pivot man from completing the play.

When the underhand toss is used, the toss is made with the throwing hand so that the pivot man will get a clear view of the ball. Always keep in mind that it is better to get one man out than to hurry the play in an effort to get two and miss both of them. Be sure of the first out before worrying about the second one.


