Stukus Fans Hold Meet

Supporters Drafting Re-Hire Resolution

VANCOUVER (CP)—Three hundred members of the British Columbia Lions football club Wednesday night recommended the club directors reconsider their decision to fire head coach Annis Stukus.

The recommendation was made at an unofficial meeting of the club membership called to discuss further action to be taken at an emergency general meeting called Nov. 14.

The recommendation then will be presented as a resolution. Directors will be able to act on it only if approved.

The proposed resolution says: "Annis Stukus has performed a valuable service in the promotion of football in B.C., and whereas the termination of Annis Stukus as head coach of the B.C. Lions is not in the best interests of football in B.C., and whereas he has qualifications for the position of general manager, be it resolved:

"1. Another meeting be called of the directors, with every effort to insure a 100 per cent attendance, for the purpose of reviewing the decision in respect to the position of Annis Stukus. And in the light of relevant facts and circumstances, reversing the decision if deemed appropriate.

"2. In the event the directors confirm their original decision, then we recommend to the directors that Stukus be engaged as general manager of the club."

Carpenter Doubtful Starter For WIFU Semi-Final Opener

REGINA — Saskatchewan Roughriders may be without the fullback Rod Pantapes, who missed the last two games because of an ankle injury and Ron Peig Blue Bombers in the opening game of the Western Interprovincial Football Union semi-final here Saturday.

Ken Carpenter, the league's top scorer, injured his left knee last Saturday night in Winnipeg and has been in hospital since Sunday morning. He was to have been released from hospital Wednesday but he was still listed only as a possible starter Saturday.

Carpenter hurt his knee when he kicked Riders' first punt and was felled on the play. "Carpenter may, or may not, be able to play Saturday," hospital officials said. "A lot will probably depend on the condition of the field. If the traction is poor, it wouldn't be wise to dress Carpenter."

Only Roughriders who definitely won't see action is guard Ray Stryk whose knee is still in a cast. Guard Mario Demore and quarterback Charlie Harding have returned to the workouts and are expected to be ready for the two-game, total-point series which winds up in Winnipeg Monday.

Leaf Centre Heading For Richest NHL Career

To Tod Sloan, a goal is like a pay cheque. Every time he scores this season, he comes closer to picking up the richest salary of his National Hockey League career.

The Toronto Maple Leaf centre took a big salary cut this season because of his drop in goal production in 1954-55. But the Leaf management told him he could add to it by scoring plenty of goals.

Sloan scored twice Wednesday night in leading Leafs to a 3-1 victory over Detroit Red Wings in a game that sent Toronto from 11th to second place. He now has seven goals in 11 games this season.

When the 27-year-old Sloan started the season he said he took the "worst salary cut of my career but I have a chance to make it my richest. My contract calls for bonuses if I get 20 goals, then 25 and so on."

ROOKIES PAYING OFF
The other Leaf scorer at Toronto was rookie left winger Earl Balfour. Right winger Bill Dineen tallied Detroit's goal.

Leaf defenceman Hugh Bolton was serving a tripping penalty when Balfour opened the scoring at 14:02 of the second period on a pass from Tim Horton.

Sloan's first goal came at 18:56 of the middle frame while John Bucyk of the Wings was serving an interference penalty. Sloan drove home left winger Sid Smith's rebound.

Dineen put the Stanley Cup champions back in the game with a goal from about eight feet out at 3:44 of the third period.

Sloan closed the scoring at 15:20 when he grabbed the puck from wing defenceman Larry Hillman and tallied on a short drive.

All six teams see action tonight. Leaf, have a chance to gain ground on Canadiens at Montreal. Red Wings are at home to New York Rangers, one of three teams tied for third place.

Chicago Black Hawks and Boston Bruins, the other holders of the third spot, clash at Boston.
