Give Fluoridation Facts Before Vote Says Doctor

VANCOUVER (P --- A proposal by city council to present a piebiscite on fluoridation or Vancouver's water supply was described today as "ridiculous" by the president of the American Dental Association.

Dr. Daniel F. Lynch of Washington, D.C., said at a press conference it was "ridiculous to ask the people to vote on a scientific question of which they have little knowledge." Dr. Lynch came here to address the Vancouver and District

Dental Society. He described fluoridation of public water supplies as "one of the greatest public health measures of our time."

But if the city was bent on presenting a plebiscite, ne said it was the "obligation of city council to present the people with the facts . . . before any vote could be taken." Dr. Lynch said persons opposing fluoridation could be divided into four categories: religious fanatics, food faddists, exhibitionists "who oppose anything for publicity" and the sincere "who fight anything that will increase taxes."

He said the benefits of fluoridation would be noticed in the family dental budget in two or three years and the cost to tax payers would not go above five cents to 10 cents per
