

Plan Intensive Effort To Promote Concerts

At a meeting last night with Maxim Schapiro, organizer of the Alaska Music Trail series, a group of interested citizens agreed to make a more concentrated effort to promote the concerts in Prince Rupert.

It was decided to form an organization to be known as the Concert Society that will take over and add to the work formerly carried on by the Civic Centre concert auxiliary, now disbanded. Dr. R. G. Large was elected president of the new body. Other officers elected were Mrs. Morris Wayman, vice-president; Mrs. A. H. Dowsey, secretary; and Mrs. W. S. Kergh, treasurer.

"The concerts can succeed only if they are regarded as a community project," Mr. Schapiro told the meeting. "The citizens on the Trail are the ones that make the Trail. The concerts will not attract an audience if they are looked upon as being entirely in the hands of a paid


