

## RCAF Concert Includes Classics, Popular Music

Both popular and classical music will be featured when the 40-piece Royal Canadian Air Force band appears here April 22 and 23, visiting Air Cadet officials said here yesterday.

Meeting with members of the sponsoring committee of the Prince Rupert Air Cadet Squadron were Flt. Lt. Hal Carling, liaison officer with the cadets; J. E. Brasseur, vice-chairman for the British Columbia air cadet group and Bert Heaton, committee members, who arrived yesterday from Vancouver by RCAF plane.

The famous band from Edmonton will play both a concert and for a dance while here.

### CHOSEN LOCALLY

Lieut. Carling, who has accompanied the band on one of its Canadian tours, said that frequently the program is worked out after discussion with local representatives who know the musical tastes of their community.

The concert will be given at the Civic Centre, while the dance will be held at the navy drill hall under the joint auspices of the Navy Army and Air Force. Proceeds will go towards promoting the work of the local air cadet squadron.

With headquarters at Edmonton where it is attached to the tactical air command, the band consists of 40 regular force air men specially selected for their musical ability. It was started in

Winnipeg during the last war and in 1946 was made a part of the regular air force. The band remained in Winnipeg until 1947 when it was transferred to Edmonton. Through the years it has acquired a reputation that ranks it as one of Canada's leading musical groups.

Featured soloists on the program will be Sergeants Len Whitley and Ken Hopkins on trumpets, and Flight Sergeant Andy Cushman on the alto-saxophone.

### EXPERIENCED CONDUCTOR

Director of the band is Flight Lt. Leo Corcoran who for the past 30 years has been associated with military, symphony and philharmonic orchestras in eastern Canada and Europe. He has been guest conductor of the Edmonton Pops Orchestra on several occasions and in his travels of Europe has given command performances for the King of Denmark and the president of France.

After its appearance here, the band will give a concert at Prince George and then is headed for a six-month tour of Europe.

The visiting officials were met here by Jack Laurie, chairman of the sponsoring committee, and members Hector McDonald, Ray Lougheed, J. F. Magor and Murray Johnston. Mr. Brasseur and Mr. Heaton returned to Vancouver today while Flight Lt. Carling will remain on to complete arrangements.


