

Doctor Assails Techniques In Treating Mental States

CHICAGO (AP)—A specialist in mental diseases claims that psychotropic shock treatments, brain surgery and drugs have failed to solve the problem of mental illness.

DR. Percival Bailey, director of the Illinois State Psychiatric Institute of Chicago, lashed out at many modern techniques for treating mental states as dangerous or ineffectual.

In a speech prepared for the annual meeting of the American Psychiatric Association, Dr. Bailey, a former specialist in brain surgery, said:

"The tasks of psychiatrists, it seems to me, is to get back in

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the asylums and laboratories, which they are so proud to have left them, and prove, by established criteria, that their concepts have scientific validity."

FORBIDDEN IN RUSSIA

He had been "frankly appalled" by the results of lobotomy—a surgical procedure for treating certain mental conditions by severing nerve pathways to a frontal lobe of the brain.

The most favorable result seems to be that the disturbed patients, after lobotomy, are easier to handle in the hospital.

He said lobotomy has been forbidden by the Soviet Union and severely criticized by Pope Pius, and is rapidly disappearing from American practice.

Dr. Bailey said insulin shock treatment in certain mental states is "less dramatic and brutal" than electric shock treatment "but its effects are also transitory in schizophrenia and there is a temptation to use it, as in the case with lobotomy, as another substitute for administration, more personnel and larger budgets."

SERIOUS EFFECTS

Moreover this treatment sometimes leaves organic syndromes more serious than broken backs, such as the loss of memory or impulsive and violent behavior."

He said that "lately the crowd has rushed to a new series of drugs" such as the "tranquillizers" but drugs do not seem to be the answer to the problem. He contended that Sigmund Freud's theories of the causes of mental illness were ill-founded and abandoned by Freud himself, but still are embraced by some practitioners.

"One wonders how long the hoary errors of Freud will continue to plague psychiatry?"

PUBLICIZE TUNNEL

State's Case In Dynamiting Completed

DENVER (AP)—The state's charge that John Gilbert Graham killed his mother and 43 others by blowing up an airliner was ready today for deliberation by seven men and five women jurors.

All evidence was completed on Thursday in the case charging the 24-year-old defendant with stuffing a 25-stick dynamite time bomb in the suitcase of his previous parent, Mrs. Daisie E. King, 55. She died in the explosion of a United Air Lines plane last Nov. 1 near Longmont, Colo., 11 minutes after taking off from Denver.

Final arguments by state and defense counsel and instructions by the court were to be given by the jury today.

Graham did not take the stand. Previously he testified in the absence of the jury that his confession to the FBI was not true—that it was given under threat that the federal agents were going to arrest his wife, Gloria, 22, for lying.

Killing Defense Usually Comes After First Lead

So much is written about the opening lead that you might gain the impression there isn't much else of importance in the defense of a hand.

Actually, the killing defense on most hands, if it is discovered at all, is discovered AFTER the opening lead.

The opening lead is one of the favorite subjects of bridge writers because it lends itself readily to neat classification. Compact little charts can be easily prepared listing the various openings in the order of their desirability. A certain opening can be labeled with some authority as a "good" opening, while another is called a "poor" opening, etc.

BLIND LEAD

The opening lead is blind in that the opener has not yet seen the cards in dummy. After the first trick however, he has seen those cards and they may be sharply at variance with the mental picture he had formed, based on the bidding.

He may have had it in mind to lead a certain suit the next time he got in. But the looks of the dummy and the play to the first few tricks may show that lead to be absolutely hopeless. He then turns his attention to some other possibility which, however remote, still offers the only hope.

To sum up, a defender's second lead is based on judgment and seasoning—not on a previously memorized chart.

ROUTINE PLAY

In today's deal Mr. Dale opened the king of diamonds. I believe Mr. Muzzy would have chosen the same card. It was routine.

Mr. Champion flashed the nine and Mr. Dale continued with the ace and a third diamond. Winning the third trick with the Dalai Lama to Pieping. The Chinese were said to have halted the Khambas at the outskirts of the city.

Mr. Muzzy ruffed low or discarded, Mr. Dale would win with the nine of spades. If he ruffed high (with the queen or jack), he could not avoid losing a trump trick to Mr. Champion.
