

Large Crowd Takes Part In Yule Carol Festival

The massed voices of 700 people joined in Christmas carols, provided a fitting climax to the Second Annual Christmas Carol Festival, sponsored by the Prince Rupert District Music and Drama Festival Association and held last night in the Civic Centre auditorium.

Twelve of the 14 choirs scheduled to participate in the festival sang a large variety of hymns and lesser known carols with the audience joining in on the more familiar Yuletide songs.

King Edward School Choir, Grades 4 and 5, opened the festival with "Once in Royal David's City" and "Infant Holy, Infant Lowly." Florence Duggan directed the choir.

The Conrad School Intermediate Choir, under the direction of Mrs. P. J. Piche, sang "Bell Carol" and "Christmas Tree Carol."

The Presbyterian Ladies Choir, under the direction of Mrs. E. J. Smith, sang "Now Once Again Our Hearts We Raise" and "Thrice Happy Morn."

St. Andrew's Junior Church Choir followed with "Come in, Dear Angels" and "Joseph Dearest, Joseph Mine," with Peter Len directing the choir.

Borden Street School Choir, directed by J. S. Wilson, sang "Bring a Torch, Jeannette, Isabelle" and "Long, Long Ago."
