Sought for Theft Of Gold Bricks

OTTAWA (CP) - Anthony Hart (Tony) Gregson, 30-year-old miner and prospector wanted for the theft of gold bricks valued at \$50,000, has been added to the RCMP's list of most-wanted men.

He is the second person to be placed on the list in a week, Last Tuesday, Edwin (Eddy) Matthew! old brother of notorious criminal. Dohalli (Mickey) McDonald, was added to the list which now includes six names,

"Gregson is wanted by the RC" MP for the theft July 3, 1954, of two gold bricks from an aircraft which was transporting them to Yellowknife. N.W.T., from the discovery mine, about 100 miles

LEAD FOR GOLD The bricks were wrapped in canvas sacks, tagged and stored apoard the aircraft. Gregson booked passage on the plane and substituted two boxes of lead of similar size, shape and wrapping to the bricks for the gold.

The theft was not discovered until two days after it occurred when mine officials unpacked the

An RCMP official said that Gregson probably disposed of the two bricks in the United States.
