## Rupert's Share Halibut Big

**Canadian Landings Here  
One-Fifth World Catch**

and United States halibut landings at 14,000,000 pounds comprised nearly 20 per cent of the total announced today by the International Halibut Commission.

### Assault Case Bail Set at \$300

Bail was set at \$300 by Magistrate W. D. Vance in police court this morning when Frank Racey, resident of Prince Rupert, for about a year, was charged with assault occasioning bodily harm.

The case was adjourned until Friday afternoon when Jerry Pettenuzzo appearing for the accused, told Magistrate Vance that the facts in the case were more complicated than appeared at first. The crown alleges that on Friday, September 17, Racey beat up and broke the arm of Mary Wong.

Also adjourned was a charge of contributing to juvenile delinquency against Leslie Lyons. Lyons is charged with contributing by supplying a juvenile native girl with liquor. To a charge of supplying Ruby Sankay with liquor, Lyons pleaded guilty and sentence was reserved until tomorrow.

Sent to jail for three months was Jeannie Ware, who pleaded guilty to intoxication. Magistrate Vance spoke harshly to the accused whose son died when the Ware home burned to the ground September 8. The accused was found in a state of intoxication not far from the scene of the fire at that time.

Only slight damage was incurred last night when a fire broke out in the gillnetter Jiggo undergoing repairs at McLean's Shipyards. City fire department reported today that a call was received at 8:30 last night but the fire at that time.

However, the fire in the boat owned by T. Campbell, had been extinguished when the firemen arrived.
