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Saturday Sermon

GOD'S ANSWER

By REV. R. J. WILSON, First Presbyterian Church
Romans 15:20: "I am sure that when I come to you, I shall come in the fullness of the blessings of the gospel of Christ."

Of all the things that Paul might have written to give courage and hope, of all the help that he might have promised to that little Christian community which had established a bridgehead in the pagan metropolis of Rome, of all the knowledge and equipment that he might have brought to Rome for its help and healing, Paul's offer doesn't sound very concrete, do you think?

And yet there it is, "I am practical!"

But that's just what the offer of Christ is, relevant, concrete. The "Good News" is that God who created us, has communicated life's meaning in Christ.

He has answered the human problem, and there is no other. He has unveiled the Truth which is at the heart of His Creation.

Human schemes and systems are passing, but this is God's news—always relevant! The blessing of the gospel of Christ!

Blessing makes it immediate.

The inflow of the Christ life is followed by distinguishable foliage, flowers and fruit.

The "concerns of your common day" become His concerns. "Those of the Way" were characterized by a distinctive attitude to the problems of life, and in death they were seeking and finding God's key to successful living. Our appeal is still to you, Christ.

I can imagine their reaction to Paul's offer. "But you don't understand, we want something

concrete, a definite answer to our problems, something to prevent these things happening. We don't want your Christ."

In essence, all this is strangely capable of a modern setting.

"What's the use of talking about Christ, let's be practical!"

Let's get to grips with actualities. Humanity is on the edge of the precipice of self-destruction, the community is perplexed by moral and spiritual problems, people are heart-broken and defeated, and you talk about Christ. Give us your advice, help us to organize, but
