- Urged were:

 - Periodic checks of patrols by police.
 - Off-street parking and
 - More sidewalks.

J. C. Ewart was named to refer these recommendations to the Parent-Teacher council, at its next meeting.

It was reported that at the Regional PTA conference held last month, a recommendation was made to get more PTA members to work for teacher "recruitment and retention."

This meeting approved any move that the PT council will take in that direction.
